Comedy needs more witchery

THOMAS DOUGALL, an experienced actor working on half a cylinder, manages to wring a few laughs out of his role as a justice who likes to live comfortably. As Edward Tappercom, the judge who would like to move into the wealthy witch's house. Dougall takes over the stage the moment he appears

John Hollingsworth as Hebbie Tyson, the mayor, strides about, blustering, "This will all be gone into at the proper time!" The part calls for a cartoon mayor so Hollingsworth hasn't much to sink his teeth into. He looks cute, irritated, very hot and insufferably bored as the evening progresses.

Brooks Crankshaw turns in a bright, frustrated performance as Richard, an orphaned clerk, One gets the immmediate impression that Richard would make a far more efficient mayor than Tyson, and one wonders why Richard runs off and marries a dodo like Alizon.

He seems like a boy who will go far, given opportunities. Crankshaw should have been allowed to work his healthy intelligence to its furthest limits.

BONNIE HARROWER looks sweet BONNIE HARROWER ions sweet as the virginal Alizon Eliot, fresh from a convent; but, alas, this play is set in the 15th century, and Ms: Harrower's blond freshness seems to have blown in from the Lion's training camp for cheerleaders.

There isn't an ounce of passion or hesitation in Ms. Harrower's bones. It is difficult to believe her portrayal of a girl who runs away from riches to marry a penniless clerk. Perhaps a few years' seasoning will add some resonance to Ms. Harrower's performance.

Dawn Walker as Jennet Jourde-mayne has clear diction and no trouble with her lines. But Jennet is the daughter of an alchemist, a charismatic witch about to be burned at the stake. She's also a Cleopatra who charms the town's leading citizens at a dinner par-ty while mobs are throwing stones out-side. She's a woman who rouses a disti-

lusioned soldier into passionate love.
Ms. Jourdemayne gives us a schoolteacher's version of "rational beliefs vs. irrational beliefs." We get speechifying, not magic, from this witch. Perhaps by this weekend, Ms. Jourdemayne will unbend and light a fire in her role.

At present, the witchery is missing, and I suspect the fault lies largely with Fry, who has written up a rather unbelievable witch.

C.M. NOVESS III gives his all as Thomas Mendip, the discharged soldier who wants to be hung. I suspect Novess is capable of good acting, and he has a few fine moments, usually when he is talking to himself at the window. But Novess never quite hits depths of swicidal rage the part calls for. "be hung," with cheery relish rather than angry despair. Perhaps the weather will drive Novess into the prost stage of mind this weekend.
David McCabe justly deserved the spontaneous round of applause he got for his too brief appearance as Mutthew Skips, the "dead" rag and bone man. McCabe is a wonderful 15th century drive, the only member of the

Mike Rontezak and Mark Honeyman are fairly alive as the competing brothers, Nicholas and Humphrey. They thump each other about with brotherly hatred. George Martin is a sweet, if monotone, chaplain. Martin is a bit too matter-of-fact in a role that calls for other worldly dimensions.
