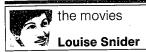


Lee Marvin is the sergeant, a soldier in two global whose life is a world of combat, in "The Big Red One."



Camera focuses on action scenes not characters

Except for a relatively dry spell during the Korean war, films about soldiers and battle have been among Hollywood's staples, from the uncomplicated heroics of "Wake Island" to the complexities and scope of "The Deer Hunter" and "Apocalypse Row."
The most common variation on the theme is to follow the fortunes of a particular group of soldiers through their combat experience. That's what "The Big Bed One" (PG) does.
The camera traipses along as a grizzled sergeant (Lee Marvin) and a squad of young recruits ("wet noses." he calls them) fight their way from North Africa to Sicily and Western Europe. The film opened to good reviews at the Cannes Film Pestival and was well received by the French press whose critics pride themselves on being the first to appreciate the bold, direct style of writer-director Samuel Fuller.

FULLER, BETTER KNOWN abroad than in the United States, impressed a small, alert number of critics with a succession of low-budget, hard-hitting, action-adventure films, including "Pick-up on South Street," "Hell and High Water," "Forty Guns" and "Shock Corridor."
Fuller's achievements have been overlooked by many, but "The Big Red One." is hardly the while to rectify the neglect. The film lacks exactly the quality that distinguishes his other films, the stamp of the director who imprints his own style and vision on a work.

This is all the more surprising when you consider that the drama is based loosely on Fuller's own seperiences in World War II. Is also to see that the war as corporal with the 1st Infancial Division (known as the Big Red One because of the red soulder stack insignia), the movie may have maderailized too late. His experiences seem to have been dulled by time. For a film that is semi-autobiographical, there is an amazing absence of personal involvement and emotion.

THERE IS SO LITTLE interaction and dialogue among the men that after two hours we've hardly learned anything about the principal characters.

Even when one of the soldiers (Griff) has a problem, it is not really shared with us. There are several references suggesting Griff is a coward, but the film introduces the subject and leaves it. We never learn more about his background, his feelings, how he handles his fear and how he survives the long string of campaigns.

The absence of character development puts the burden on the action scenes to maintain our interest. Here again the film fails. There's a lot of noise, but not much excitement and almost no suspense.

The squad locates enemy artillery, cleans out snipers from a town and a forest, keeps slogging or doing whatever it is ordered to do. That's fine for soldiers, but not for drama and not for audi-

Purpose of the program, according to producer John W. Puchalski, is to give local teenagers an extension of their high school theater programs. "We give them the opportunity to learn new and different techniques while taking on more of the show's responsibilities," he said.
"In fact, we picked 'The Wizard of O2' primarily because it's different than the classical form of musical theater the kids have been used to doing.

"IT WILL REQUIRE much more from them as actors and actresses, as children's theater requires performers to relate more to the audience than

to relate more to the audience than would a straight adult show."

Though the ultimate objective of the group is to put on a musical production supervised by theater professionals, the program is also designed to be an educational workshop series.

"The performers are learning new styles of acting, and the set crew is learning to ultilize steel in their set construction," Puchalski said.

Auditions for the show took a full week. Eric M. Johnson, a recent the tater graduate of the University of Detroit said, "One of the first things I had to do with the kids as director of the show was to get them to just read the script. They were giving me dialects and were being cute with the characters."

"Naturally, a lot of these kids have not developed the basic skills of acting.

"We've tried to stress to them that the bigger-than-life quality of theater does not mean the actors have to be unreal. I think they're learning that the most important thing about acting is being honest and believable. Once you've got those qualities, you can go anywhere with your characters."
