Broder is executive managing editor of B&G Publications, Shapiro is Detroit managing editor and Strageer is print-ing and graphic arts consultant.

Broder said he's like a general contractor. He pays the artists, salesper-sons, managers, publishers and mostly the bank.

The directory includes descriptions of nearly 250 area eating establishments, 150 miniature menus and detailed maps.

If you'd like to know the location, price range, dress code and business hours of eateries in and around Detroit, you'll find that information in the directory, Broder said.

"I saw a restaurant guide in Phoenix which was poorly designed and being sold for \$5.95. Broder said. "I figured I could publish one which is better and cheaper (\$4.35). I designed directory around the competition using the phone book and making a master list of the best restaurants.

"We got some salespersons to do the leg work like picking up restaurant menus. Some of the owners and managers were skeptical about young kids knocking at their doors. They didn't believe we could pull it off. It took us nine months, but we did it."

Broder said he regrets the book didn't come out in time for Christmas. But he hopes for an avalanche of sales during the Republican National Convention The directory will be sold in gift shops of hotels hosting delegates, he said.

THE DIRECTORY is gradually gar-nig interest, according to Broder, and is available at many drug stores, book shops and office supply outlets. "We're already planning a totally revised 1982 edition." Broder said. "Our master plan is to produce a simi-lar directory in other cities. It it's suc-cessful in one city, it can go over in others."

The enterprising young publisher conceived the idea for the directory when he was only 17 and a freshman in college. But he has been involved in a variety of businesses since he was 13.

"I entered the stock market after my bar mitzvah," he recalled. "I invested in a utility company with bonds and savings certificates I received as gifts.
