Some things I learned while flying out of Windsor Airport, a logical point of departure for flights within Canada:

• There is a limousine service from Detroit to Windsor airport, but you can also take a bus through the tunnel and a cab/ limousine from the Richelieu Hotel to the airport. The hotel backs on the tunnel exit. The Air Canada office is in the same building. Both front on Ouellette Avenue, the main street of Windsor.

- Always check and double check, and still leave extra time, for any limousine. For example, Air Canada told me by phone that the limousine leaves 55 minutes before a scheduled flight. At the Air Canada office in Windsor, they told me it was one hour and 15 minutes before flight time. It was actually 55 minutes.

● The limousine turned out to be a regular cab. It costs \$3.50 per passenger, compared with the \$8 it would cost if you hired the cab independently.

You can't count on the driver to give you any exchange on your American money, even though it is worth considerably more than Canadian money. You also can't count on the driver to give you your change in American money, so either change your money you your change in American money, so either change your money and the bank or carry small bills. Most Windsor business establishments give a decent exchange rate, and change in American money if you want it, although the rate is never as good as you would get at a bank.

● On the deficit side, our driver said "people aren't tipping much right now, and we make money any way we can." My fellow passenger only had American money, so I changed it for him and he gave the cabbie a 25-cent tip. Serves him right.

ON THE PLUS SIDE, the cabbie did something I don't often see anywhere any more. He carried my bag to the cab, and from the cab to the airline counter. That was worth a tip.

- Occasionally you have open seating on plane, as on the daily light to Winnipeg, Manitoba. That means your seat is not speci-fied, you choose it as you board. Watch for smoking and non-smoking signs. I sat inadvertently in the smoking section and had to move when the air got too thick.
- Drinks cost twice as much on board an Air Canada plane if you fly within Canada as they do if you fly Air Canada outside of Canada. The stewardess said it was because of local taxes.
 The stewards and stewardesses on Air Canada have always given flight information in French and English. There are so many German travelers in Canada and the U.S. now, because of the favorable exchange rate between the German mark and the American dollar, that I twice heard the instructions given in German as well.

DaWSON CITY is a historic city full of gold rush stories. It is also the scene of a new gold rush, because gold that wasn't worth mining at \$35 and once.
