HELPING HANDICAPPED — By a vote of 19
for and 217 against, the House refused to water
down a Department of Transportation regulation
requiring that municipal buses bought with federal
grants be equipped with wheelchair lifts. The
amendment sought to give cities the "local option"
to choose means other than lifts to satisfy the fedral law insuring the handfepped access to mass
transportation. It was offered to an appropriations
lil later passed and sent to the Senate.

Smut in the fields is bunt on the land

Common bunt, also known as stinking smut, is reappearing in Michigan wheat fields.

Bunt was a problem disease during the first half of the century but was brought under control in 1950s through the use of volatile mercury seed treatment. In 1970, the use of volatile mercury in agriculture was banned as an environmental hazard.

In 1975, bunt was found in two Michigan wheat fields. In 1977, evidence of bunt was found in six lower peninsula counties.

"Bunt is occurring again this year in wheat fields planted with seeds one or two years removed from certified," asy Pat Hart, Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service plant pathologist. To prevent bunt from again reaching the epidemic stage, Hart recommends that all wheat seed be treated.

"It's advisable for seed that is one or more years removed from certified to be submitted to a commercial surry treatment," he says. "Several chemicals such as pentachloronitrobenzene (PCNB), heachlorobenzene (HCB) and thiram are used to control bunt. Carboxin is effective against both bunt and loose smut."

For management of other common wheat dis-

For management of other common wheat diseases, like root rots, leaf rust, cephalosporium stripe and powdery mildew, Hart recommends that wheat be planted no sooner than 10 days after the Hessian fly-free date.

"Several years of research at MSU has shown that late planted has fewer disease problems and miss bishow toldist" he says.

that late planted has fewer disease problems and gives higher yields," he says. Hart also suggests that, for best results, growers plant only Michigan recommended wheat varieties.

Rep. Clarence Mier, R-Ohio, the sponsor, said:

cut.

Bonior and Ford did not vote.

ZIMMERMAN NOMINATION — The Senate confirmed, 68-27, the nomination of Republican Don A. Zimmerman to be a member of the five person National Labor Relations Board, which adjudicates disputes between labor and management in accordance with laws such as the Taft-Hartley Act. Counting Zimmerman, the board has three publicans felt Zimmerman would be anti-business. Sen. Harrison Williams, D-NJ, a supporter, said the campaign against Mr. Zimmerman springs from a misguided partisanship that is unfortunate. .

Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, said that with Zimmer-man as a member the NLTB would be tilted 4-1 against business, and that consequently "we are in danger of having labor-management chaos in this country because of the stacking of the National La-ber Relations Board."

Senators voting yea wanted Zimmerman to sit on the NLRB.

Sens. Donald Riegle and Carl Levin, both Democrats, voted yea.

ASSENTEEISM — The Senate voted 74-1 against instructing the Sargeant-at-Arms to call absent senators to the floor. This was necessity to achieve a quorum so that the Senate could vote on a cloture motion to end the fillbuster against Don A. Zimmerman's nomination to sit on the National Labor Relations Board. The cloture attempt falled, but the next day the Senate need the fillbuster and confirmed the nomination (see preceding vote). Senators voting yea wanted to improve attendance on the Senate floor so business could be conducted.
