

## Taking shots at the Rivera

"You gotta have art" has long been a popular slogan for the Detroit Institute of Arts. And art they have in abundance — and plenty of heart, too — in their open invitation to amateur photographers to come down and shoot "anytime were open."

Nemo Warr, director of photography for DIA for the past 14 years, says, "I like the idea of photographers looking for a souvenir shot. It makes a good picture when you have friends or family in a beautiful stiting, and a favorite painting photographed here is a fine memory."

All that's required is a simple permission slip which can be filled out easily at any of the Institute's entrances.

WARR OFFERS these tips for

getting successful photos:

• Use color film — preferably high-speed Ektachrome, Type B. This is a slide film that is balanced for the tungsten lighting in Institute galleries to give you exciting, true color transparencies.

Because of its high speed, you'll be able to hand-hold the camera and won't need flash or tripod. Just usyour camera's light meter to determine exposure. If extra exposure to determine exposure. If extra exposure to determine the ASA at 20 instead of 160 and ask for a Kodala-peed el processing called ESP-1. Prints can be made from your lavorite slides.

If you prefer color precessing.

• If you prefer color negative film, use Kodacolor and an electronic flash. Remember, Kodacolor is a daylight balanced film, so a flash unit (which simulated adylight) must be used. Kodacolor shot under tungsten lighting with no flash will produce a slight overall orange cast to your prints.

Keep in mind the basic guide-lines of composition and camera handling — they're important at the museum, too. Move in close, fill the frame with the painting or artwork, hold your camera steady, and squeeze the shutter.

Overall views can be good, but concentrating on a particular detail of a painting will reward you with a shot that has impact.

WARR POINTS OUT that any works of art owned by the DIA are welcome subjects for your camera. However, exhibits on loan or art be-longing to outside donors may not be photographed.

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Two all-new gallery areas are now open in the DIA. A new North Wing area houses African and Native American art. The Schwartz Graphic Arts Gallery was just completed to house permanently drawings, watercolors, posters and photographs.



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
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
