

And the coach had plenty to cheer about at the nationals. Bonaventure burned up the flat, 100-meter oval in Lincoln's Pershing Auditorium, winning five division titles and establishing eight national records.

Bonaventure finished first with 200 points. High View Skating Club of Louisville, Ky., placed second. "We went there thinking we had a chance to repat," Dooley said. "But in this sport everything depends on when they peak. We'd been having some pretty sloppy practices, but I guess the excitement of being in the nationals pulled them up."

Two of Dooley's best skaters are senior (18 and over) competitors Rob Dunn and Chuck Jackson. Both were outstanding in the nationals. Dunn, a 20-year-old Mt. Clemens resident who's been on roller skates since age 7, won the senior men's division. He set records in winning the 1500-meter (25.03) and the 5000-meter (95.33) races and placed second in the 3000-meter.

JACKSON, 19, of Westland combined to repeat as champ senior two-man 5000-meter relay with a record time of 9:15.4. Dunn and Denise McLood of Livonia teamed up to win the senior 3000-meter mixed relay in 5:43.1, another record.

Bonaventure's 400-meter mixed relay (Kathy Katovich, McLeod, Jackson and Dunn) established another record with a winning time of 7:24.6. Sue Dooley, the coach's wife, Katovich, Tammy Griffith and McLeod combined to win the four-lady 4000-meter relay with a record 7:40.5.
