Antique car buffs show wares at Meadow Brook

There are cars. And then there is his tory on wheels.
For John Sullivan, that means a 1934
1/12 Packard 1107 Club Sedan; for Mike Weiner, it's a 1937 supercharged Gord convertible; for Terence Adderly, a 1938 Auburn supercharged boattal speedster; and for Ken Weller it's a 1937 Horch Cabriolet.

Mike Weiner, for instance.

One recent morning, Weiner was in Bill Bizer's restoration-specialty garage surrounded by Cords in various stages of disrepair. On his face was the kind of grin you usually see on teenagers holding hands and staring, soulfully, into one another's eyes.

But in Weiner's case, he was staring deeply into the hand-rubbed, deep maroon, nitrocellulose leaquer finish of his pride and joy, that 1937 Cord with the supercharged Lycoming engine.

He liked what he saw.

"When I look at that car, it's like looking at a beautiful diamond. That low with a laws appears to me I. get, not obsessed — what's the word I'm looking for?" messmerized. Jet messmerized.

WEINER WAS exaggerating, of course. His car is not even faintly like a diamond. After all, it's maroon.

It's more like a ruby.
In any event, Weiner has good reason
to grin. When he bought the car, "it was
in bushel baskets, literally, in a guy's
basement." It took Bizer four years to
complete the restoration.

Weiner turned down a purchase offer six weeks ago, and anytime you can go eyebal-10-eyeball with \$90,000 and say "No," you deserve a grin.

The Cord and the others are some of the 100 antique and classic cars expected to be displayed Sunday at the second annual Concessor D'Eleganec acr show at Rochester's Meadow Brook Hall.

For auto enthusiasts, the show is nothing less than mind-boggling. Consider Duesenbergs cheek-by-jowl with Bugattis, Marmons cozying up to Autours, Daimles next to Pierce Arrows. And makes only true diehards even know how to pronounce: Esotta-Fras-

And makes only true diehards even know how to pronounce: Isotta-Fras-chini, Ruxton, Talbot, Delahaye, La-gonda and Minerva. What the cars all have in common is their status. They are all luxury cars, and most contain significant, some-times even revolutionary developments in automotive technology.

that turn in the same direction as the car. Weller's Horch has built-in jacks. Adderley also owns a Duesenberg that took a first-place at last year's Concurs and tubricates its chasts automatically every 75 miles. And in addition to their innovations and their luxury, there's also performance to consider. The four-cylinder Model A had a top speed of about 55 mph. The show cars were the fastest things on the road in their day.

SOME OF THEM may still be — their owners tend to be a little coy on just how fast they can go. For instance, Weller believes his single four-barrel carbureted Horch produces 400-500 horsepower, compared to as little as 50 in today's tiny smog wagons.

"It has so much bore and stroke, when I put it into overdrive at 70 I don't think it's turning 2,100, 2,200 rpm," said Weller.
That may sound like gibberish to you, but it boils down to a top speed potential of well more than 100 mph.
Weller said the Horch gets "just about six miles to the gallon, but who carrest"

He can't prove it because most factory records were destroyed in World War II, but Weller believes the car was originally ordered by Adolph Hiller for Heinrich Himmler, the "draeded chief of the SS," as Weller describes him. Weller estimated the Hore's is worth "475,000, minimum." If you're curious, it bears a strong resemblance to the Mercedes-Benz 540K.

Terence Addrely, of Bloomfield Hills, owns five old cars including the Auburn he'll enter Sunday.

"The Auburn Company, which was in its day one of the leading auto manifecturers, built about 2,000 of these boattails and they sold one for about \$2,200 and even at that price they lost money. They were sold as attention-getters," Adderley said.

"In those days, they didn't throw things out. The '35 Auburn wasbuilt using an awful lot of parts from the '33."

The Auburn, the Cord and the Dussenberg, incidentally, have something more in common than just being old and classic — they were all designed by the same man, Gordon Buehrig, who now lives in Grosse Pointe.
