Discover your library this month. Things get back into full swing in September, so you're bound to find something of interest, no matter what your age or situation.

We're all feeling the effects of the up and down economy, some more sharply than others. If you've been laid off or are looking to enter the job market, join us at 7 p.m. Sept. 22 in the Farmington branch on Liberty when we present "Unemployed? How to Market Your Skills." A speaker from the Job Service of the Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC) will give current information on the labor market in the Detroit area, training options one might consider and tips on how to prepare a resume.

Prospective parents, new parents and parents of toddlers are invited to a special program, "Infant and Child Furniture Safety." One of the largest causes of child accidents is unsafe or improperly used children's furnishings. Join Robert Del Rose of Baby World 'N' Teens as he gives advice on how to shop for your child. This free program will be offered at 7:30 p.m., Sept. 29 in the Farmington Library.

Programs will include activity classes, story hours and special for preschoolers. There will be drawing, folklore, dance and crafts for various grade levels. Children are invited to attend our various open programs which don't require registration. Offerings at the Farmington branch will include "Cat

Following is the preliminary agenda for the Farmington Hills council meeting of August 25 to begin at 7:30 p.m.

- Consideration of introduction of amendatory zoning ordinance C62-222. Zoning request 20-5-80. Section NE ¼, part of 23-18-200-215 Location is 12.8 acres on west side of Halsted, south of 12 Mile. Request is to change from RA-1 and LI-1 to IRO. Proponent is William Bowman.

- Consideration of enactment of amendatory zoning ordinance C62-223, zoning request 21-5-80. Section is SW ¼ of 23-31-101-009. Located at 21600 Haggerty, 4.3 acres. Request is to change from RA-1 to OS-1A. Proponent is William Bowman for Edmond Sward.

- Consideration of enactment of amendatory zoning ordinance C62-224, zoning request 23-5-80, section NE ¼, part of 23-227-012 located at southwest corner of 14 Mile and Middlebelt. Request 7.51 acres from RA-2 to OS-1A. Proponent is Robert Schmirer.

- Consideration of enactment of amendatory zoning ordinance C62-225, zoning request 24-5-80. Section is 2 SE ¼ of 23-2-426-009 and 010. Located at north side of Northwestern, west of Middlebelt. Request is 3.1 acres from RA-1 to OS-1; 0.23 acres from B-1 to B-3; 0.4 acres from OS-1 to B-3. Proponents are Robert Jacobs and Roy Marshall.
