

Oakland Live Y'ers place 3rd at Battle Creek

The Oakland Live Y'ers concluded the summer swim season at the Summer's End Invitational Meet in Battle Creek over the weekend.

The AAU 'A' meet attracted 51 clubs from seven states, including California, Florida, Illinois, Ohio and West Virginia. Six girls and 12 boys from the Live Y'ers were represented at the meet, which was held at Kellogg Community College's 25-yard indoor pool.

Coach Pete Hovland's Live Y'ers — Rochester's combined age-group swim team based at Oakland University — took third place. Midland was first with 398 points, followed by Battle Creek (283) and the Live Y'ers (233).

Just two weeks ago the older and

more experienced Live Y'er swimmers helped their team to a third place finish at the state AAU long-course championships.

"This performance (in Battle Creek) culminated a very fine year of swimming for the Oakland Live Y'ers," said Hovland. "We've come a long way in one year... we've come a long way in three years of existence."

"As they have all year, the boys' 13-14 group was the backbone and nucleus of the team," said Hovland.

THE OLDER swimmers were again the dominant force for the Live Y'ers in Battle Creek.

Doug Cleland, 14 years old, who won three gold medals at last week's state

championships, put on another superlative performance.

Cleland won the boys' 13-14 High Point trophy by taking six first places. His wins were in the 200-IM (2:02.99); 50-yard freestyle (22.98); 100-yard backstroke (55.19); 100-yard freestyle (50.34); 100-yard breaststroke (1:08.27); and 100-yard butterfly (56.42).

Cleland swam in two open events (for all ages), placing second in the 200-back and ninth in the 200-free.

Bruce Verburg, 14, took second in the backstroke, and third in the 200-IM, 50-free and 100-free.

Antoine Keyser, 14, who beat Cleland in the 50-free at the state championships, finished second to his team rival

in that event this time around. He was also sixth in the 100-free.

Sporting big drops in most of his events, John Lippert, 14, took sixth in the 200-free with a six-second drop in time. He finished fourth in the 50-free with a two-second drop.

David McAfee, 13, had over a minute drop in the 1,500 swim (66 laps), and an eight-second drop in the 200-free. Kevin Reed dropped two seconds in the 100-free.

JIM BRUZZESE, 15, placed second in the 200-IM with a time of 2:00.75, and third in the 100- and 200-yard breaststroke events. Bruzzese, who swam in all open events, also finished sixth in the 200-free.

Stere Consoni, 16, finished second in the 1,500-yard swim with a time of 17:04.11. Ben Stern finished third in that event, and both were close to Junior Olympic cut-off time.

Carl Consoni placed fourth in the 200-IM.

Paula Consoni placed in all nine individual events she entered and won two first-place medals. She won the 200-IM (2:13.42) and 200-breaststroke (2:34.32), and finished second in the 100-breast and 200-free, fifth in the backstroke, sixth in the 500-open free, and fourth in the 100-free.

Sherie Fedak continued to improve her times. She took fourth place in the 100-yard breaststroke, fifth in the 200-IM and sixth in the 100-yard backstroke.

Golf registration still on

Even though the registration deadline for the annual Observer & Eccentric Golf Tournament is still 2 1/2 weeks away, entry forms are coming in at a good pace.

Sign-up deadline is Sept. 7 for the 36-hole men's tournament, which will be contested Sept. 13 and 14. However, once the 25 places allotted to the field are filled, registrations will no longer be accepted regardless of the date.

As of Tuesday afternoon, approximately 45 entries had been turned in for the men's tournament. Traditionally, the biggest crunch comes during the final week.

There has been no problems in the past with too many women signing for their 18-hole tourney,

which will be conducted Sept. 17 this year. In fact, participation has been disappointing the last few years.

Gary Whitener, golf professional at Whispering Willows in Livonia — site of both tournaments — is hopeful that a Wednesday date will avoid league conflicts.

Women with school-aged children should be able to complete their rounds before the youngsters get home.

Women golfers who have played regularly but never entered a tournament are especially encouraged to compete and get an idea — admittedly on a much smaller scale — of what the professionals contend with week in and week out.

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a regular meeting at the City Hall on August 11, 1980. Mayor Soronen opened the meeting at 7:30 o'clock P.M. Mr. Savage gave a report on the completion of Lincolnshire paving.

Ordinance C52-221 request to rezone from RA-1 to OS-A in Section 16 (23-104-005 part of) was introduced.

Council approved request of transfer of ownership of Class C 1978 license with Dance permit, from F. D. Stella Products Company to R-2, Inc., at 30859 W. Ten Mile Road. Council approved Resolution for 8 Mile Road water main payback.

Council approved the date of August 25, 1980 for Public Hearing for the Economic Development Corporation "Greenbury Project" (formerly Arrowsmith). Bid for Greening S.A.D. C-134 was awarded to Electra Construction, Inc.

Bonding Resolution for Haggerty Road Sewer SAD No. C191 was approved.

Bonding Resolution for Haggerty Road Water SAD No. C132 was approved.

Bonding Resolution for Meadowview Water SAD No. C135 was approved.

Bonding Resolution for Nine Mile Water SAD No. C135 was approved.

- 2.E.21.80 prohibition of right turns to all north and south bound traffic at intersection of Orchard Lake Road and Thirteenth Mile Road during reconstruction.
- 2.E.22.80 prohibition of right and left turns during various stages of reconstruction of the intersection of Orchard Lake Road and Fourteen Mile Road to all north and southbound vehicular traffic.
- 1.D. 17-80 for the installation of a Traffic Control Signal at Grand River and Ten Mile Road.

Council approved contract with AAA Maintenance Company (cleaning service). Upon motion meeting adjourned.
