Breathtaking. Sprinkled liberally with new touches, Adolfo's collection, 1980 doesn't miss a beat. The modest, diminuitive designer couldn't ask for a better year.

Another plus in Adolfo's favor is that while his clientele has grown, so have the number and kinds of new styles he offers. His current collection includes such things as long-torso treatments, inventively patterned handknit sweaters, Hapsburg sil-

houettes, new jacket shapes, ruffled blouses, full velvet skirts and, for the evening, jet and rhinestone paved dresses.

"The collection expresses a totally classic and contemporary feeling for day," said Adolfo when he accompanied his collection to Saks Fifth Avenue.

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"MY EVENING clothes evoke a 1830s feeling. They are reminiscent of "Little Women" or Jenny Lind, was Adolfo's analysis.

The designer did not forget the past for his simple day wear. His straight chemises and smock dresses are both knitted in the signature flame-stitch pattern that first made him famous. Adolfo's new Jacekts are cut like boleros; they impart a new sense of panache to torso lines. Cut like colonial uniforms, some are loosely shaped like a Victorian combing jacket while others are more fitted.

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Adolfo's famous boucle knit suits are designed in combinations of knit and silk jacquard. Others are combined with silk prints that use a Victorian flame-stitch needle point.
