Register now for O&E golf tourney

Even though the registration deadline for the annual Observer & Eccentric Golf Tournament is still 2½ weeks away, entry forms are coming in at a good pace.

Sign-up deadline is Sept. 7 for the 36-hole men's tournament, which will be contested Sept. 13 and 14. However, once the 225 places allotted to the field are filled, registrations will no longer be accepted regardless of the date.

As of Tuesday afternoon, approximately 45 entries had been turned in for the men's tournament. Traditionally, the biggest crunch comes during the final week.

There have been no problems in the past with too many women signing for their 18-hole tourney, which will be conducted Sept. 17 this year. In fact, participation has been disappointing the last few years.

Gary Whitener, golf professional at Whispering Willows in Livonia — site of both tournaments — is hopeful that a Wednesday date will avoid league conflicts.

Women with school-aged children should be able to complete their rounds before the youngsters get home.

Women golfers who have played regularly but never entered a tournament are especially encouraged to compete and get an idea — admittedly on a much smaller scale — of what the professionals contend with week in and week out.

Registration for the women's competition closes Sept. 10.

Entry fee is \$25 for men, \$11 for women. Registration blanks are available in most editions of the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers and at Whispering Willows, which is located on Newburgh Road just south of Eight Mile Road.

Only amateur golfers who live in the O&E circulation area may participate.

Tennis and Crumpets returns to local area

The Oakland County Final will be Sept. 13 at Square Lake Racquet Club. The top teams in classes A, B, and C will compete. The Super-Finals, encompassing the teams from Wayne County as well as Oakland County, are Sept. 20.

An added feature to this year's tournament is a singles format. Players without partners will compete in a round-robin event in their respective classes on Sept. 6. The top male and female players — after the round robin — will team up for competition on Sunday.

Any girl interested in attending the clinic may sign up for a free class by calling 335-6770.


Jr. netters shine in tourney
