## Dems select slate for state court, school posts

A long-time Democrat linked with the Detroit Cavanage

A long-time Democrat linked with the Detroit Cavanagh years and a relatively unknown party regular were nominated for the Michigan Supreme Court at Sunday's state Democratic Party convention in Cobo Hall.

Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Joseph B. Sullivan, 58, defeated state Court of Appeals Judge Michael F. Cavanagh, 39, and Attorney Warren D. Bracy Jr., 38, of Ann Arbor for one nominisation.

Also nominated, without opposition, was Elizabeth B. Burch, 55, a Dearborn attorney and former 16th District Democratic Party chairman.

WHILE THE Nov. 4 election for two state Supreme Cour justices is officially "non-partisan," the two major politica parties nominate the candidates that appear on the November ballot.

Sullivan of Grosse Pointe Park, a circuit judge since 1974, defeated Cavanagh after two ballots. The two had agreed before the 3,154 state convention delegates voted that the loser would not oppose Mrs. Burch, a late entry in the nomination process.

"I got into this race only Friday at 10 o'clock," Mrs. Burch said after her nomination Sunday

use of the late Jerome Ca-vanagh, Detroit's mayor during most of the 1960s. Sullivan was Jerome Cavanagh's campaign manager in 1981 and was the city of Detroit purchasing commissioner in 1967. He was

elected Wayne County Clerk in 1972 and elected to the circuit court in 1975.

WITH 49 PERCENT of the first ballot vote, Sullivan was 30 votes short of nomination. Bracy, the only black supreme court candidate, dropped out of the race and urged delegate to vote for Sullivan. Bracy received 7.5 percent of the first

On the second ballot, Sullivan won with 54 percent of the

Among suburban districts, Sullivan won the 2nd (including Livania and Plymouth), 15th (including Canton Township, Westland and Garden City), 17th (including Southfield and the Farmington area), 18th (including Troy) and 19th (most of Oakland Couty including Birmingham-Bloomfield, West Bloomfield and Pontiac).

Cavanagh was a narrow winner in the 12th District, which includes Rochester and part of Avon Township.

INCUMBENT JUDGES seeking re-election include chief INCOMBENT JOINES SEXING re-election include chief Supreme Court Justice Mary Coleman, nominated last week by the Republican Party and Justice Charles Levin, elected as an independent in 1972 after failing to win the Democrat-ic party nomination. Also nominated by the Republicans was Michael Hegarty, 47, a former Livingston County Commis-

sioner. The candidates will run for eight-year terms.
While Sullivan said he will pay "no particular attention to
knock off" either incumbent, both he and Ms. Burch agreed
that Judge Coleman was too conservative. Ms. Burch labeled
herself a "moderate."

Ms. Burch downplayed her lack of judicial experience. "I don't think you need judicial experience," she said, citing supreme court Justice G. Mennen Williams, a former gover-nor first elected to the court in 1970.

"I'm a trial lawyer and I have lots of trial experience," Ms. Burch said.

FOR OTHER statewide education offices, the Democrats nominated former Wayne County juvenile court Judge James H. Lincoln, 64, and Carroll M. Hutton, 60, of Highland, a semi-retired adult education director for the United Auto Workers, for two eight-year terms on the State Board of Education.

Nominated for two eight-year terms on the Wayne State University Board of Governors were Murray E. Jackson, 33, of Detroit, a Univerity of Michigan professor of higher education and former Wayne County Community College president and Elena R. Sanchez, 39, of Saginaw, a secretary in the UAW Region 1D office and a state party officer-at-large.
