

Community House tour offers Toronto weekend

Toronto — the "People City" is on the travel agenda for The Community House in Birmingham, with the annual trip scheduled the weekend of Sept. 19-21.

The Community House is inviting persons to join the group tour, which will include round-trip transportation (by air-conditioned bus), accommodations at the Four Seasons Yorkville Hotel (on the edge of Yorkville), and cocktails and dinner at Hy's Yorkville Restaurant (a four-star restaurant).

Also included is Sunday dinner at the Canadian National Tower, sightseeing in Toronto, Edwards Gardens and the Ontario Science Centre, a box lunch en-route to Toronto, plus a sandwich lunch

returning to Birmingham, all luggage handling, tips and taxes.

The per-person price for the package is \$185 (double occupancy). There is a \$55 single supplement.

STROLLING FAMILIES, camera-toting tourists, picnicking office workers, squirrel-feeding children and zig-zagging cyclists... all are species indigenous to Toronto. The city is at once a blend of the old and the new, with streets to enjoy by day or night.

High on the list of places for strolling and people-watching is Yorkville, a village within the city. This colorful area is filled with renovated townhouses, boutiques, quiet courtyards, restau-

rants and art galleries.

Other points of interest include the Royal Ontario Museum with its significant collection as a leader in Egyptology; the adjoining McLaughlin Planetarium with a quiet wooded walkway and ivy-covered buildings; Chinatown, with the sights and sounds of another culture and a great area for exploring Oriental shops and restaurants; and Eaton Centre, designed around two of the city's most prominent landmarks in keeping with Toronto's drive for architectural preservation.

The Canadian National Tower is one of the world's tallest free-standing structures (1,815 feet) with indoor and outdoor observation decks, a revolving

restaurant (where The Community House group will dine) at the summit and family fun arcade at the base. The glass-fronted elevators afford a heart-stopping ride upward.

THE ONTARIO Science Centre is everything that is impressive... the setting — a beautiful ravine; the architecture — futuristic, clean and startling; and the interior — fascinating.

All things pertaining to the world of scientific exploration are presented in a stimulating manner which invites involvement, in keeping with the center's slogan, "please touch."

Working models, computers, lectures, demonstrations and film shows

are some of the attractions.

For Community House guests who are interested in nightlife, this cosmopolitan city offers everything from top jazz artists to the latest disco beat; rooftop lounges like The Odyssey at the Four Seasons Hotel, spectacular views of the city at night as well as music and dancing; and O'Keefe Centre, with its array of talent to light up any stage.

A multitude of nightclubs offer a variety of live talent.

The Community House group will leave at 9 a.m. Sept. 19 and arrive back in Birmingham at approximately 9 p.m. Sept. 21.

Legion honors Canadian

The National Americanism Committee of the American Legion's La Societe des Quarante Hommes et Voix Chevaux has selected Byron MacGregor of West Bloomfield as the recipient of its "National Americanism Award" for 1980.

The award will be presented to MacGregor on the evening of Sept. 26 at the Arlington Hotel in Hot Springs, Ark., during the American Legion's National Convention Banquet.

MacGregor is the first Canadian to ever receive this award. He is being recognized "for his unique contribution to the American way of life... through his recording of the patriotic narration 'The Americans' and a more recent release entitled 'Stand Up America.'"

The "Honor Society" of the American Legion also cites MacGregor's work "in telling the story of America, for urging Americans to stand up and be proud, and for helping to strengthen and build new confidence in the future of America."

In addition, MacGregor's donation of more than \$100,000 to the American Red Cross from the royalties received from the first record was noted by the Award Selection Committee.

Canadian-born MacGregor's voice was first heard around the world in 1974, via the recording of "The Americans," which originally was an editorial written by Canadian newspaperman Gordon Sinclair, defending the U.S. and the shabby treatment it had received on the world scene. That record sold more than three and a half million copies and all royalties were donated to the American Red Cross.

Late in 1979, after the take-over of American hostages in Iran, MacGregor was urged to update the original record in an effort to wake up apathetic Americans during this most recent crisis.

MacGregor, 32, is the afternoon anchorman at WWJ "NewsRadio" 95 (the all-news CBS affiliate in Detroit) and the evening news anchorman for WKBD-TV 50 (Detroit). He was born in Calgary, Alberta. He attended the University of Alberta at Calgary and began his broadcasting career in 1966 as a disc jockey at CFAC radio in Calgary.

He also worked as a newsmen in Winnipeg, Manitoba and Yorkton, Saskatchewan, before becoming news director and morning newsmen at CKLW radio in Windsor. During his 10 years at CKLW, he received several Radio/Television News Directors Association Awards and the Michigan Press Award for outstanding news coverage.

MacGREGOR is active in many community and charitable organizations, including membership in the United Foundation's Speakers Bureau. He was recently elected to the American Lung Association's Board of Directors.

He is a member of the Radio/Television News Directors Association in both the U.S. and Canada, Sigma Delta Chi, American Federation of Television and Radio Artists, the Detroit Press Club, the Adcraft Club of Detroit and the Detroit Rotary Club.

MacGregor's wife, Jo-Jo Shutt, is an American.
