North running backs Doug Schulte and Rick Roth, both seniors, showed that they're worth watching. Schulte, the bigger of the two at 185 pounds, gained 91 yards in 12 carries and scored two tuchendeds on short runs. Roth gained 67 yards in 16 tries and scored a touchdown.
North scored a TD in its second drive of the game, and then added 20 more points in the second quarter. Northern

mistakes set up the Raiders on the first two scores. North recovered a PNIH fumble on the Raider 33 and needed seven plays for the TD, a two-yard run by Schulte.

A bad snap on a Northern punt gav North the ball on the 30 near the end of the quarter. Roth carried the ball four times in the touchdown drive, but Schulte went over from the one.

threw an interception to Macielak, who was playing defensive halfback. Kopko ran eight yards around end for the TD.


