

# Livonia Stevenson rips Redford Union, 32-12

Livonia Stevenson football coach Jack Reardon wouldn't come out and say it directly, but he hinted — with a slight smile — that psychology might have been a factor in his team's 32-12 win Friday over Redford Union.

"Maybe we weren't ready last year," Reardon said. "We talked about last year and how emotional RU was. I think kids think about things like that."

The Spartans transformed thought into action and averaged the 12-0 defeat inflicted by RU in the 1979 opener.

The smaller Spartans seemed to confound the visiting Panthers with their mis-direction running plays.

Stevenson quarterback Matt McAuliffe, who played behind both Dave Hall

and James Fox last season, proved that he can throw the football, too.

Stevenson started from its own 42 yard line after taking the opening kickoff and marched 58 yards in only five plays. Kevin Spala scored the touchdown with a 35-yard romp around right end on a counter play.

RU took the ensuing kickoff and suffered misfortune on its first offensive play from scrimmage. Steve Quinlan intercepted a pass from Andy Szabo and Stevenson was in business again at the RU 30.

McAuliffe completed the first of his three touchdown throws during the game from the 12 yards out to give the Spartans a 12-0 advantage just six minutes into the game. Rich Sanders was on the receiving end of the pass.

The Panthers failed to generate any offense during their third possession and punted only to Stevenson's 45. The Spartans drove again and scored their third touchdown seven seconds into the second quarter on a 13-yard pass from McAuliffe to Brian Burke.

RU finally started moving the ball midway through the second quarter and broke into the scoring column on a beautiful 36-yard TD run by John Uych on a draw play.

The Panthers had one more good scoring opportunity late in the quarter, but a halfback pass on fourth down fell short of a wide-open receiver.

Stevenson took a 26-6 lead into the locker room at the half when McAuliffe capped a 63-yard drive with a 13-yard touchdown throw to Quinlan. Wayne

Probst caught a pass from McAuliffe for the two-point conversion, the only points-after-touchdown Stevenson converted during the game.

RU received the kickoff to open the second half and drove all the way down to Stevenson's three yard line, but eventually lost the ball on downs at the Spartans' 17.

That turn of events, both Reardon and RU coach Harvey Heitman agreed, took the winds out of the Panthers' sails.

Stevenson raised its lead to 32-6 with only nine seconds remaining in the third quarter. Gary Biermann bolted over right guard, broke a tackle, cut across the field and ran 30 yards into the endzone.

Mike Petouhoff gave the Spartans

good field position prior to the touchdown by returning an RU punt 25 yards.

RU scored its other touchdown midway through the fourth quarter on a 10-yard pass from Mike Lowney to Tim Holme. The Panthers moved the ball 30 yards in six plays following a shanked Stevenson punt.

"We didn't really put anything fancy in," Reardon said. "The kids executed well and hit well."

"I was very, very pleased with the play of the senior quarterback (McAuliffe)," Reardon continued. "When he sprinted out, he really attracted the defense and made them commit themselves."

Reardon also cited the work of his offensive line — Rob Kurzawa, Joe Mulville, Marty Kaplan, Jim Schoenle and Brad Wolter. "The inside people are those who really do it for you,"

SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS  
CITY COUNCIL MEETING  
AUGUST 25, 1980

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a regular meeting August 25, 1980. Mayor Sorenson opened the meeting at 7:30 o'clock P.M. Members present were: Burwell, Lange, Oppenheimer, Sorenson, Wolf, Alkateer and Dolan. Others present were City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney.

Council approved the minutes of August 11, 1980.

After the public hearing the Project Plan for the Economic Development Corporation of the City of Farmington Hills, Donald B. and Mariellen Greenbury Project, including issuance of Limited Obligation Revenue Bonds of approximately \$1,700,000 was approved.

Public Hearing on cost estimate for road improvement for Inkster Road from Northwestern Highway to Thirteenth Mile Road was adjourned to September 8, 1980.

Contract between the Mercy Center and the City of Farmington Hills for the purpose of conducting a senior adult program on the premises of Mercy Center was approved. Amended Ordinance C62-221 to rezone NE 1/4 of Section 18 part of parcel 23-18-200-212 on the west side of Halsted and south of Twelfth Mile Road from RA-1 and L-1 to IRO was introduced.

Council enacted Amended Ordinance C62-221, parcel in the NW 1/4 of Section 18, 23-18-104-005 at 27404 Drake Road from RA-1 to OS-1A.

Amended Ordinance C-5-40 to the City Code 80-570 regulating the use of alarm systems and certain telephone connections was enacted.

Council enacted Amended Ordinance C62-223 a parcel in the SW 1/4 of Section 31, 23-31-101-009 located at 21000 Haggerty Road from RA-1 to OS-1A.

Amended Ordinance C62-224 to rezone from RA-2 to OS-1 parcel in the NE 1/4 of Section 2, 23-2-277-012 located at the SW corner of Fourteen Mile and Middlebelt Roads was enacted.

Council enacted Amended Ordinance C62-225 rezoning 23-2-426-009 and 010 on the N side of Northwestern west of Middlebelt Road, 3.1456 A from RA-1 to OS-1, 0.2890 A from B-1 to B-3 and 0.4152 A from OS-1 to B-3.

Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem were chosen as delegate and alternate for Farmington Hills at the annual business meeting of Michigan Municipal League.

A Study Session for discussion of Emergency Medical Services is to be set.

Council accepted the consent judgment with amendments in the case of Ross vs. City of Farmington Hills, (Northwestern Highway south of Middlebelt Road).

September 8, 1980 was set for public hearing for Revised Ross Company Project Plan.

Council asked the Planning Commission to consider and recommend a similar ordinance to IRO that would have no geographical restrictions at a lesser height limit than presently provided of 10 feet of the existing IRO.

The state as recommended for delegates to the Michigan Municipal League Workers Compensation Self Insurers Fund was elected.

Administration is to report to Council on a scaled down version of city-wide sidewalk program by February 1981.

D & K Corporation was awarded the contract for paving Nine Mile Road east of I-75 in the amount of \$149,876.45, their bid being low.

Council adopted Traffic Control Order for yield right-of-way for Gettysburg Road and Vicksburg Road in Section 8.

Council approved speed limit of 25 miles per hour from 745 feet east of Northwestern to intersection of Middlebelt Road thirty minutes before Warner Middle School and Eagle Elementary School open and thirty minutes after closing school day.

Council authorized the extension of Waldrin Drain in the amount of \$5,300 to Rainbow Construction.

Meeting adjourned.
