Stingray Swimmers Capture Meet Titles

FARMINGTON Jan Peterson of Birmingham was a standout for the Michigan Stingrays swimming team, whose home pool is at Mercy Center on Middle Belt between 11 and 12 Mile in Farmington, in a recent swimming meet in Lakewood, Ohio. The Birmingham miss won the high point trophy for 11 and 12-year-old girls in the age group competition. She won the 100 and 200 yard freestyle races and tied with teammate Carol Saputo in the 100-yard backstroke. In addition, Jan finished second in the 200-yard individual medley and 100-yard butterfly.

THE STINGRAYS team, composed of girls from Southfield, Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills and Livonia, swept the relay in the girls 11-12 age group. Jan Peterson, Carol Saputo, Debbie Saputo and Kathy Kolon won the 400-yard and 200-yard medley relays and the 200-yard freestyle relay. The Saputo girls are from Beverly Hills and Kathy is from Southfield. Mark McPartlin of Birmingham brought back the silver medal in the boys 13-14 age group 100-yard freestyle and teamed with Mike Rado, Brian

Laffler and Paul Peterson to take second place in both the 200-yard medley relay and the 200-yard freestyle relay. Other Stingray swimmers who placed in the top five in the three-day meet included: Vicki Brown of Livonia, placed third in the girls 11 and under 100-yard backstroke; Kathy Kolon, third place in the girls 11 and 12-year-old 100-yard breaststroke; Debbie Saputo, fourth place in the girls 11 and 12-year-old 100-yard butterfly; and Paul Peterson, fourth place in the boys 13 and 14 100-yard butterfly.

THE TEAM is coached by Mrs. Sally Prior who formerly coached the Central Aquatic Club. She was named the age group coach of the year in 1968 in Michigan and is president of the Michigan Amateur Aquatics, secretary of the Michigan AAU and chairman of the Junior Olympics swimming meet held during April. Among the Stingrays achievements this season are four new AAU records and two high point team trophies.

OU Tells Offerings

Many evening courses of particular interest to women, ranging from art and watercolor to child psychology, are about to begin at Oakland University's Division of Continuing Education in Rochester. You needn't be a Van Gogh to participate in beginning and intermediate drawing. It is designed to aid students in finding beauty of nature through simple drawings with model and to observe the basic attitudes in the creative arts. Possibly a course in modern aesthetic reasons "Ballet: Aesthetics and Appreciation" art is more to your liking. It surveys 20th century European and American painting and sculpture for their foundations in 19th century impressionism and post-impressionism to the present. Whatever your desires, Oakland University's Division of Continuing Education has something to stimulate the interest and further the education of every woman.

Another course in child psychology entitled "Infancy Through Adolescence" will delve into child development, behavior management, expectations of parents, intelligence and creativity; motor and physical development in the first three years of life, behavior management, learning in infancy and early childhood, and the psychology of parents.

Q What is scientific forest management?
A In the early years of Michigan's industrial development, loggers overcut our native forests and left behind eroding ravinements. Consumers Power helped to restore these lands through reforestation. Today, through scientific forest management, we set limits on the number of trees cut down and continue to plant new trees where needed. Thus the forests provide a continuing harvest for use by the wood and paper industries.

Q What kind of recreation facilities are available on Consumers Power lands?
A Consumers Power maintains 39 recreation areas along the Muskegon, Manistee and Au Sable Rivers. These areas are variously designated for camping, boating, picnicking and fishing. All are open to the public, and we ask only that visitors respect the rules pertaining to use of the lands. For reasons of sanitation, we try to keep the public particularly aware of camping regulations.

Q What are the limits of camping in the recreation areas?
A Camping is permitted only at those sites where it is authorized. These authorized campsites are equipped with the necessary services and facilities. Most are operated by the State of Michigan. Consumers Power must insist that any tents and trailers in unauthorized areas be removed. Only by observing the rules can we keep our recreation sites in good condition for use by all.
