other artists from the foundation come in from time to time to help or give demonstrations.

The oil painting classes are given on the same drop-in basis as every other program or activity offered in The Gathering Place.

"We don't ask any one to sign up for any set number of Wednesdays. We don't take roll call. We invite seniors to come and sit in with us. We're not professors. We just share what we know with those who want to spend a Wednesday afternoon with us," she said.

There is also no registration. Classes are under way now, running from 1:15-3:15 p.m.

THOUGH MRS. Schmidt said all of the work she has now that is suitable for showing is in the current show in the library, she will be represented in the Palette and Brush show next month, given in Birmingham Bloomfield Art Association.

Her work will also be numbered in the Farmington Artists Club's annual pre-Christmas show in Mercy Center.

The artist's early morning hours are

spent "running around the track at the Y," she said, and her Wednesday mornings are spent as a student with Sister Mary Ignatius.

On Thursday, Oct. 23, the center
