High-speed police chase yields bad check suspect

The chase began on Farmington Road to Grand River, then east on Grand River. During the 20-minute chase, the suspect's car sideswiped a car driven by Deborah Cox of Farming-ton Hills, tearing the front bumper loce

loose. That accident occurred at Grand River west of Orchard Lake, where Farmington Hills police joined the pur-suit. The car proceeded along Grand River to Middlehelt, where it turned north and traveled in the southbound lane, forcing several oncoming cars off the road.

The suspect turned eastbound on 9 Mile, drove to Telegraph, then turned south. The pursuit continued to west-bound 8 Mile where police from South-field, Redford Township and Livonia joined the chast where police from South-Beech-Daily, southfield police set up a road block that sent the fleeing vehicle and a grassy median where it struck the utility pole head-on. Horton was arrested before being transported to Bolsford.
