MRS. GURWIN finds her roles in the theater and as wife and mother quite compatible. Rehearsals are usually in the evenings, and Gurwin takes over the parenting role. He also provides business and legal advice for the production company.

A number of shows already pro-duced, including "Funny Girl," can be moved and re-staged. Mrs. Gurwin says there's a great deal involved with re-staging and re-lighting but with adjust-ments it can be done.

"Our company has the advantage of having a group of dedicated professionals who are now comfortable with one another," she says.
