Plant your shrubs now for lush spring blooms

In this cycle of the garden year, gardeners are beginning to eye the bins of spring blooming bulbs in the stores. At Kingwood Center, Mansfield, Ohio, Fred Roberts, director, plans the annual tuip display.

His sage advice is to plant tulips six inches apart on centers and put them in the ground about four inches to the top of the bulb.

Mulch with an inch of corncob mulch. Plant only when the soil temperature is below 50 degrees.

Although most tulips don't produce as fine a bloom after the first year, they are still worth replanting, Kingwood cuts off the flowers as soon as



they begin to shatter.
He digs up the plants without removing stem or foliage. He dries the bulbs in a dark, ventilated place, either on traysor hung in bunches.
His advice is to cut off the dried stems in late August. Keep only the best appearing ones.

Treat with a fungicide before plant-ing later. In following columns we will give more aids for bulb selection.

DAFFODILS BENEFIT FROM ear-ly planting. As for the other bulbs, it seems as though every rodent in the neighborhood is waiting behind a bush

to make a call and eat the bulbs.

My advice would be to plant most bulbs after the chipmunks, mice and squirresh have all located their apartments for the winter.

This is a good time to review the west side of your home. This is the location to consider developing a windbreak to cut the winter winds.

Smart plant selection can reduce your fuel bill by 10 to 15 percent. Windbreak reduce the speed of the freezing gusting winds. They also lessen the effects of the wind chill index.

To the sun, dwarf barberry is good for the sun, dwarf barberry is good for sundry annuals. Don't forget creeping phlox and the small bulbs for early spring accents. Sedums come in many varieties and lend interest.

Tip your major boulders back to control runoff. As plants are placed, mulch over the soil with interesting textures such as bark or chips.
