Monsieur Joseph: True maitre d'

Monsieur Joseph is back at the Benchmark restaurant in Southfield's Michigan Inn.

The man who is a true maitre d' has returned to his first love, spending time with people in the restaurant, as well as supervising behind the scenes.

Joseph Inst came to the United States in 1975 from the French Riviera, where he started out as head captain and eventually ran his own restaurant in Monte Carto.

He was the maitre d' at the Benchmark from 1975-77 and built up his own following of customers. They came to the hold of customers. They came to the hold of sustemers are since but also to enjoy the special attentions of Joseph.

"I LOVE THE dining room. I love the people," Joseph said with enthusi-am during a recent morning interview before the hotel opened for luncheon

business.

"A maitre d' is just like a football coach," Joseph explained. If he's not happy in one place, he just moves on, he said.

The accounts for the fact that since leaving the Benchmark in '7', he pened up Jacques continental restaurant in Bingham Farms, then Duglass Buglass' Restaurant Duglass in South-field, worked at the Golden Mushroom in Southfield and also at the Sheraton-Southfield.

"I great them with the French," he continued, detailing some of a maitre of special charm. "I escort them to a table, have a little talk with them. If they want something special served at

The tableside dishes can't be on the regular Benchmark dinner menu (a new menu is coming shortly), Joseph said, because he wouldn't have time to serve numerous diners. But when time permits, he can do scampi French Rivi-era style. Joseph is also known for his Cassar Salad, prepared tableside, from his own special recipe.

"JACQUES WAS a big challenge to me. It still is one of the most beautiful dining rooms there is," he said, recalling some one of his stops (eight months there) before returning to the Benchmark.

"All of Momen Williams—came of the stops of the city—Gov. "All ying Associety of the city—Long associety of the city—Long associety—In the same and Jacques." Working at Restaurant Drejass, "a lot of people followed me over there." He added: "I respect Duglass. He's got quite a following, too."
Of the Golden Mushroom, he said: "It's a good restaurant. Chef Milo is super. But it's not my style of dining room. I'm more for formal."
I'd didn't fit the dining room. People were coming with blue jeans. Here I was with a tuxedo."
At the Sheraton, they're trying to build up the Loophole "as classy dining. It has the potential, but they (the management) didn't come with the money."

Joseph noted, however, that the room will be redecorated soon, the wooden chandleirs replaced with more formal ones, and a stained glass panel removed to allow space for a cockail bar.

IN 1978, the Benchmark received a seal for best menu from the National Restaurant Association. "It's still a nice menu," he said, but the offerings of the last three years will be changed to "go a little on the Cuisine Nouvelle (new cuisine)." The Benchmark is open for lunch and dinner, with free valet parking now

available. The diner's ticket is stamped by the Benchmark. There's still a free rose to each woman guest, and when reservations are made far enough in advance, matches at the table bear the name of the person who requested the table.

"When a client spends like \$30 for his dinner, he has to receive A-1 service," Joseph said.

"Most of the people working under me are very, very happy. I give them very good training."
