A bit further ahead are the arrival of the daily newspaper via the video screen and ordering groceries and making restaurant reservations by video screen.

Pas-tels will be news into the early '80s fol-lowed by the onslaught of rich, dark colors making bold and handsome statements. Warmer pastels will be the most popular. 6. AMERICAN STYLE COMES. INTO ITS OWN — It will emerge as the most important trend of the next decade. It is happening already here

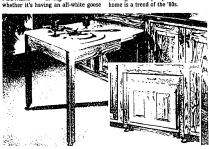
and in Europe as the preppy and clas-sic American western looks hit the run-

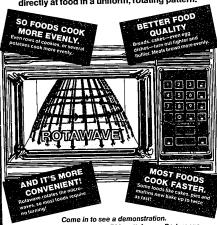

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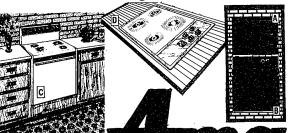


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
