## Dungeons and Dragons is roll-playing for fun

Let's try to lay this out — you'll pardon the expression — logically. First, what we're dealing with: Stuff like Gamma World, Chivalry and Sorcery, Tunnels and Trolls, Metamorphosis Alpha, and the everpopular Dungeons and Dragons. The difficulty in seeking logic is obvious

All these are games. They have no end. There are no winners. But you can get killed playing these games, or at least your game persona can be. And when that happens the war, as they say the margine is over for you. So while

reast you gaine preduct were as they say when the language over for you. So while there are no winners, the dead guys are losers. Presumably.

Like sunsets, though, the rules of the game can change daily.

Just what are we dealing with here?

Fantasy, of course. And also "Monster Manual," "Dungeonmaster's foude," "Detties and Demigods." These are the rulebooks, sort of.

geonmaster hasn't used his eraser yes, said Jim Vaughn.
"No matter what rules the dungeon-master writes down, you can't force him to stick by it," says Vaughn. "Do not tick off the dungeonmaster. His word is the last word."

DUNGEONMASTER, by the way, a term derived from the Dungeons and Dragons game, is losing popularity in the more mundmane alternatives of 'referee' or "judge." The dungeonmaster holds court over a game played, usually, by no more than six participants. "Just as Fritos is a form of corn chip, Dungeons and Dragons is a form of role-playing game. It happens to be the most advertised, the most notorious and the oldest, by a couple of months," Vaughn explained.

New games cropped up both because Dungeons and Dragons proved popular in the marketplace, and because the price — the four rule books alone retail for \$51, Vaughn says — invited compe-tition. Small lead figures of various characters and creatures — not really necessary to the game, but helpful in keeping track — cost \$50 cents to \$1 each. Vaughn owns 900 of them.

Vaughn, a 26-year-old Westland man with a degree in history and geography — the importance of which should not be downgraded in a man busy about the business of building his own world — has a part-time job at a shipping company.

But that's for money. For fun, Jim Vaughn is a dungeonmaster. It was that role that drew his appearance last week before a full house in Noble Li-brary. Nearly 60 persons — mainly youngsters — showed up.

VAUGHN'S TASK was to explain VAUGHN'S TASK was to explain what the games are and how they function. He spent the best part of two hours trying to do it. But, as it turned out, most members of his audience are fans already and he had much unexpected work to do in the way of explaining the fine points of blink dogs, clerics, paladins, fighters, rangers, spelleasters, and the other work-a-dad-94-0-5 subway riders of the normal fantasy world.

As is true in many board games, the fantasy, role-playing versions depend for their outcome largely on the throw of dice. Like nearly everything else connected with role-playing games, however, even the dice themselves are, well, different.

Instead of being white and six-sided, Instead of being white and six-stued, like most dice, the game dice come in different colors and shapes and can contain as many as 20 sides offering up to 100 different potential roll totals. This adds a certain uncertainity.

In its most basic form, the role-play-

ing game involves a party of characters which leaves a village, journeys to an underground cavern — the dungeon — encounters various bad guys, discovers treasure and returns to the village. In the encounters with the bad guys, the characters run the risk of losing and being killed off. If they win, however, they accumulate points and when they've got enough points, they advance in experience levels. This makes it harder for them to get killed.

THE TREASURE and the points function something like &H Green Stamps — when players accumulate enough of them, they can "buy" knowledge, skills and other desirable attributes and objects like magic tallsmans. In more elaborate game forms, the characters do not return to a village. They simply keep moving about on the game board, encountering new adventures. This is called a campaign. This is called a campaign. This continues, potentially, until the players grow grey beards and die of old age. If the player losses an encounter with a bad guy and gets killed, he tyrns to the dice and creates a new character. There are six basic characteristics determined by the dice — strength, intelligence, wisdom, dexterity, constitution and charisma.



Dungeonmasters are, of course, free to modify this list. Vaughn has. Since he likes his players to identify closely with the characters, his list extends to such non-outcome related attributes as hair and eve color

hair and eye color.

The games are played on paper marked with hexagons, each of which usually indicates a five-mile area. Vaughn, though, has embarked on a quest, if you'll pardon the expression. He's building his own globe, his own world, using a system assigning 25 square miles to each hexagon. Vaughn will create different situations in each individual beyagon.

will create different situations in each individual hexagon.
"I wouldn't give the power of creation to anyone in my game but myself," explains Jim Vaughn.
A series of Wednesday night Dungeons and Dragons games will begin at the Noble Library in about five weeks. Also on tap are training sessions for potential dungeomasters. Call the library at 421-6500 for more information.
