First show marked by artist's gentle use of color

This has been a landmark year for painter Lyn Parker of West Bloom-field. Her career as a studio artist which she has been working at di-legently for five years suddenly came together.

She won first prize in the Birming-ham Bloomfield Art Association May show. Two of her works were accepted

in the Scarab Club silver medal show last week, and her first one-woman show opened at Gallery Renaissance in Renaissance Center.

Mrs. Parker, former successful New
York textile designer, switched to fine
arts after she married Dr. Jeff Parker,
internist, and moved to this area. She
came to the Midwest as a new bride,
wondering if she had given up all possibillities of a career in the arts. She had
a bachelor's degree in psychology and

first decided to do master's work at Oakland University in that field with the intention of going into art herapy. "But, I knew I had to paint," she said as she stood in her attractive West Bloomfield home waiting for her 40 paintings to be loaded and transported to the Gallery Renaissance. So take she returned to the pattern her parents had begun to establish when she was a youngster.

"I've been taking art lessons since I

l ever made," she said.

SHE ENROLLED IN CLASSES at
the Birmingham Bloomfield Art Association and studied with Sophie Fordon,
Marllyn Derwenstus, Mary Jane Bigler
and Reva Shwayder. She also studied
with Hava Schaver of Farmington
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Hills.
Not long ago, she found a studio in Farmington which has helped both home life find art career.
Now, as mother of two daughters, 2 and 3, she can work uninterrupted at her studio and concentrate on her art.
"Twe always set aside two days a week for me — Tuesdays and Thursdays I paint. The rest of the time is for my family."

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Even with that limited schedule, Mrs. Parker is a prolific artist. She talks and thinks quickly. The speed with which her comments about her work come suggest the rapid flow of creative ideas for painting.

Painting, in fact, is almost too general a term for Mrs. Parker's work. Her paintings are multi-media and this combination of acrylies, crayon and pencil often includes collage using prints or photographs in a transfer technique.

The influence of her training and work in textlies is readily apparent.
"I started out with collage. I can't, get away from it. I like the three-dimensional look of collage," she said. "I have definitely been inspired by Rauchenberg. ... my dream it so have a conversation with him about his work." The art classes and combination of home and art careers make easy-to-satisfy demands on the energy which Mrs. Parker has in an inordinate degree.

"Her seemingly boundless supply is apparent in her work, not only in the quantity, but in quality and character as well. She does large diptychs, in the combination of acrylic, crayon ampenci, lots of slightly smaller works that are primarily collage and many others that combine a variety of techniques.

She doesn't wish to use what she sees on these trips except as stimulation for her own work. She said that long before it's time to come back to Michigan, she can hardly wait to get back to her studio. It's as if the canvas or paper is in froat of her while she's in the city, waiting to be filled.

In her latest large works, the placement of the lines, squiggles and color is far more random appearing than in the earlier works which are more structured collages. There's a looseness in the latest works that's suggests the security and enjoyment which the artists has about her work. The control is there, but never obvious. The flow of line and color looks spoatneous which it is except that the artist has been perfecting these skills of hand and eye for many years. Therefore, she has access to the values of each one.
