## Church workshop views ways it disrupts

Coping with the pressures of life — whatever their source — is the theme of a day-long workshop Oct. 18 at St. Paul United Presbyterian Church, 27475 Five Mile, Livonia.

The 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. conference will include a keynote talk by Dr. Robert Ward, professor of medical education research and development at Michigan State University, and 14 workshops that programming community people in to discuss many aspects of stress.


