Discussing the need for funds, drive chairman Conroy said: "If we are going to solve problems and there are many problems to be solved, we need the Y and the tremendous job it does. To do this, we must become personally involved in this fund-raising effort."

COMFORT SAID: "If the community responds to the goal of \$14,000, then the Farmington YMCA can continue to serve the youth of this community. Without community support we will have to eliminate some of our programs.

"Twenty per cent of our operating budget comes from the community. And we make this 20% go along way. In 1989, we raised \$11,000 - this is only \$3,000 more.

Comfort continued, "We had 179 contributors in 1989. The difference in the amount needed this year has to come from new persons. We hope we can trust these friendships and support for 1970."
