

# Happy Raiders end slump

The way North Farmington's basketball players were carrying on, you'd think they'd won a state championship instead of only their first game of the season.

But the Raider girls were ecstatic Tuesday night after they beat city-rival Farmington Harrison, 36-35, for their first win in 11 starts this season. The victory was North's first since the 1977 season.

Meg Henrich made two free throws with 14 seconds left to play to give North's its one-point margin of victory. Henrich led all scorers with 14 points to go with her nine rebounds and five steals.

"For these girls, it was like winning the NCAA championship," said Greg Grodzicki, North's first-year coach.

Lori Winkel scored 10 points, and Sue Ferguson had eight for Harrison, which led by a point (17-16) at halftime. Harrison led 1-10 record under rookie coach Mike Hickey.

On Thursday, Oct. 16, Harrison plays at Waterford Mott and North plays at Redford Union. Both games have 7:30 p.m. starts.

In another recent game, Farmington Our Lady of Mercy made it 10-straight victories this season with an 82-38 thumping of Detroit Dominican in the Catholic League's Central Division.

DENISE BASFORD, Mercy's leading scorer last season who had been sidelined with a stress fracture of her left foot, returned to the lineup against Dominican. She played about 10 minutes and scored two points.

Suzanne Dietz scored 16 points for Mercy, and teammate Kelly Fortescue added 12. Mercy poured in 30 points in the first quarter and built up a 25-point lead.

"I loved that first quarter," said Mercy coach Larry Baker. "That's as many points as I can remember Mercy ever scoring in an opening quarter."

Dominican had the game's leading scorer in Terri Kelly, who tossed in 20 on eight field goals and four of eight free throws.

Mercy has a 7:30 p.m. game at Harper Woods Bishop Gallagher on Thursday.

Wendy VanDeSande scored 20 points for Thurston, which led by 18 points (30-12) at halftime. Stacy Green, Farmington's 6-foot-3 center, scored 11 points and blocked eight shots before fouling out with about two minutes left.
