

Franklin dominates Thurston, 28-0

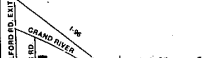
Livonia Franklin took advantage of good field position to score the bulk of its points last weekend during its 28-0 Northwest Suburban League football conquest of Redford Thurston.

"I hope it turns into one of those games we've had in the past," Vigna said. "We've had some close games. I hope we can stay with 'em."

Thurston punt to score its initial touch-down midway through the first quarter. Ron Gunter scrambled 9 yards up the middle on a dive play. The Patriots advanced 43 yards in six plays for the TD and were aided in the drive by a 15-yard face-mask penalty.

While Detroit's best bowlers have been rolling 700 series in record numbers this season, they will have to bow to the Sillia's team of Cleveland for the top score in the nation.

In the regular league appearance last week, the Ohio team rolled a 3799. This is the second highest team total in the history of bowling, and has been bettered only by the Budweiser team of St. Louis that bowled 3858 several years ago.

One of the features of the Ohio's big count was the fact that John Gernone, the low man on the team, rolled a 729.

THE SHARPSHOOTERS were in top form in the Westland Bowl mixed classic last Friday. When they ceased firing at the pins, they had registered three that exceeded the 700 barrier.

Topping the list were Dick Beattie and Gary Zarich, both posting 769. It was the first time this season that a 769 had to share the lead.

Beattie got his count by linking games of 223, 257 and 289, while Zar-

ich opened with 257, added a 266 and closed with 246.

Behind this pair came Chuck Powell with 725, which included a 279 game; Ken Lang with 705; and Tom Gredell and Bob Goike Jr., who tied at 702.

In the ladies invitational doubles, Jane Martin finished in front with a 659, on games of 203, 223 and 233.

THE BOWLING fraternity in Detroit mourns the passing of one of its all-time greats, Steve Morris, who died early this week after a heart attack. Morris' bowling career included 337 perfect games and a place in the Detroit Bowling Hall of Fame.

RAY VANDERWILL found the range at Farmington Lanes and topped the Monday men's league with a 671 series that included a 265 game. His closest competitors were Tom Murphy (650), Bud Demarioux (646), and Bud Londo (642).

MARION HEATH made the most of a 132 spot to win the weekly competition in the Livonia Ladies classic. She rolled a 480 series and the spot gave her a 612.

In the individual games, Doris Macorkindale took the first with 170-38-208. Peg Eizenrei took the second with 175-41-216 and Dollie O'Brien captured the third with 166-55-221.

OTHER GOOD performances included Tom Domolitski's 267 game in the St. John Bosco league at Garden Lanes. This was 100 pins over his average. Stanley Philawski paced the St. Linus league with 614 and Lloyd Runaud showed the way to the Livonia Men with a 662, while Virginia Singer showed the way in the ladies classic with 634. At Merri-bowl, Carol Topic had a 244 in a 654 in the bowlerettes loop.

In the men's trio at Woodland Lanes, Reggie Temple was top man with 258 in 652 and Sandy Carpenter was high in the hits and misses league with a 205 in 502.

JERRY MAYNOR set the pace for the Plaza Lanes bowlers when he posted a 663 series and beat Don Andrews by 23 pins in the pile drivers league, while Ron Eitisan rolled 630 to take top honors in the Super Bowl classic.

John Walling scored on a 14-yard dive play. Walling gained 38 yards earlier in the drive with the very same play.

Thurston threatened Franklin's goal twice during the game.

The Eagles advanced to the Patriots' 3-yard line only to lose the ball on downs at the nine late in the second quarter.

Thurston had first and goal at the four, but was foiled by three incomplete passes and a sack of the quarterback.

Charles Dziedzic caught a 13-yard pass during that march.

The Eagles also used a passing attack to get the ball to Franklin's 15-yard line during the fourth quarter, but Check ended the threat by intercepting a pass.

During that drive, Thurston completed passes which gained 22, 21, 18 and 13 yards.

Franklin collected 245 yards total offense, all but 30 on the ground. Walling carried 10 times for 92 yards, Gunter 17 times for 70 yards.

Thurston accumulated 95 yards.
