## Lynn Moers' journey home will take some time

Lynn Moers wants to go bome. But it will be at least four months and \$30,000 before he gets there.

Moers, 30, has been paralyzed from the neck down since July 16, when a tree struck the Westland resident as he was clearing his yard of debris left from the violent storm last summer. When it fell, Moers was flipped, breaking his spinal cord.

there will cost \$85,000. Of that, Moers' insurance from Unistrut in Wayne will cover \$55,000, leaving a \$30,000 bal-ance.

While at the institute, Moers will be trained to become "functional enough to live at home. He'll be able to sit up in a wheelchair which he can operate

Since Moers served seven months in Vietnam, organizations such as the Veterans of Foreign Wars and Disabled American Veterans are raising money. Also gathering contributions are Fr11 Stores, St. Mary Church and other smaller groups, according to Burke.
