## **Subway foes** will bypass appeal route

Last week's Oakland Circuit Court decision removing four public transportation advisory questions from the Nov. 4 ballot won't be appealed. County Commissioner Anne Bobart, R-Waterford Township, a co-author of the referendums, told the Board of Commissioners Thursday she was 'frustrated and outraged' by Circuit Judge William Beer's ruling, but added that the ruling wouldn't be challenged.

Beer River Wednesday ordered the advisory questions of the habito because he said the county board had no legal authority to put them there. Beer's decision was in response to a sult brought by the betroit Metropolitan Area League of Women Voters.

The four questions addressed funding of a regional transportation system as proposed by the Southeastern Mehigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA), creation of a county-operated transit system, and the county's continued membership in SEMTA, a seven-county regional authority.

"THE PRO-SUBWAY forces have denied the citizens a voice in how \$1 billion of their tax dollars will be spent," said flebart, chairman of the county board's Republican Cancus.
One advisory question asked if Oakland County should be taxed for a "transit system including a subway as proposed by SEMTA."
The subway portion of a rapid-rail line, part of the estimated \$1.5-billion regional transportation plan, is opposed by Oakland and Macomb county officials.

SEMTA was recently granted initial federal funding to develop a light-rail rapid-transit line. It will run underground from downtown Detroit to McNichols (six Mille pRoad and on surface from Six Mile to Eleven Mile Road in Royal Oak.
