If see two of the state's top high school teams clash as Harrison and North Farmington put their 7-0 re-cords on the line in the 10th-annual neighborhood grid battle. A lot more than city pride will be at stake for the two teams. Coach Ron Holland's North Raiders are in the run-ing for a borth in the state Clase. nonano s vorta laders are in the run-ning for a berth in the state Class A post-season playoffs. Harrison's Hawks, coached by John Herrington, can qualify for the Class B playoffs. North could be eliminated from the

playoff picture if it loses. Harrison, horever, could lose one of its two re-maining games and probably still make the playoffs. North, which wrapped up the North-west Suburban League title with a 28-0 win over Llowia Franklin, is a high-scoring team, averaging 28 points a game. Herrigoto knows his gauda will have to stop Raider running backs Rick Roth and Doug Schulte. Quarterback Jim Franchi, a good with North's strong offensive line and defense, which has allowed 56 points this season, including 21 in a three-overtime victory over Westland John Glenn.
