

Chocolate creations taught by an expert

Barbara Dermody, a gourmet cook who shares her expertise in many sessions in Farmington Community Center, has scheduled two classes in November to teach how to create chocolate desserts for the holidays.

Both sessions will run from 10 a.m. to noon on Tuesdays. The first, on Nov. 11, will teach how to create Sachertorte. The second, on Nov. 18, will teach how to create Buche de Noel.

The recipe for Sachertorte is her own, concocted from a "chocolate

sponge cake base, topped by chocolate frosting.

"This can be easily duplicated after my demonstration," Mrs. Dermody says. "The trick is in the proper beating technique."

Her Buche de Noel is the French version of an old-time yule log which is now a traditional Christmas cake.

"The modern version is rendered with meringue mushrooms and leaf motif to keep the woody feeling of the original, non-edible yule log," she said. French delicacies have intrigued

Mrs. Dermody ever since she studied at the Sorbonne.

In both sessions guests receive step-by-step recipe instructions. The \$6 fee includes beverages and the dessert of the day.

MRS. DERMODY and Judy Antishan are now serving "Lunch With Us," that offers one select menu in Farmington Community Center from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Thursdays through mid-November.

This season she leads a new class in

the center called "Cooking for Boys and Girls" for those from the third to sixth grade.

She is co-creator of "Holiday Appetizers," an annual how-to session in the center.

Mrs. Fowler was a featured guest a few months ago on WXYZ-TV's Friday Feast, with Jack McCarthy, who applauded her expertise.

She's coming to Farmington Community Center's Fabulous Friday event "Chocolate Molding" Nov. 7.

From 1-3 p.m., guests will learn the basic steps of the art as they watch an expert create chocolate-covered cherries, caramel turtles, peanut-butter cups and other treats suitable as Thanksgiving favors or Christmas gifts.

Mrs. Fowler said, "Candy can be made at a fraction of the store-bought price and it will be more flavorful. I use only quality milk chocolate which contains no additives such as paraffin

wax to spoil the pure chocolate taste."

Guests will also learn the art of painting with chocolate. The mold is painted on the inside with flavored-colored chocolate. After it hardens and cools, the mold is filled with liquid chocolate. After this cools, it is unmolded. The result is a chocolate piece that looks like shiny ceramic.

"I have Santa Claus molds, adorable snowmen molds that look as if they're

wearing a hat and scarf and Christmas ornament molds. The end results are all, of course edible, and can be given to the kids as suckers or they can be used to decorate the tree or as a unique centerpiece," Mrs. Fowler said.

Participants will receive printed recipes and samples to taste.
