Mike McKinnon scored two goals and assisted on another by Mark Bartram. Jim Sharm scored Farmington's fourth goal on a penalty shot. Pat Rapin and Doug Warner each had an assist for the winners. Falcon goalie Jack MacIntosh was credited with 18 saves.

GIRLS' SWIMMING

Farmington High's 400-yard freestyle relay team came through with a crucial first place to help the Falcons beat Dearborn High, 44-39, last week. Farmington is 8-0 under coach Mark Holdridge.

The freestyle relay (Margaret Richards, Laura Edwards, Kim Pogue and Amy Edwards) logged a time of 3:59.2. Farmington's 200-yard medley relay (Laura Edwards, Cindi Meil, Dawn Stanton and Jo Smith) won with a 2:01.2 clocking.

Farmington won one-two in the 500 freestyle with Pogue winning (5:43.6) and Laura Edwards taking second (6:05.0). Stanton won the 100 backstroke (1:07.6), and Amy Edwards won the 50 freestyle (26.7).

Farmington swims next on Tuesday at home against Livonia Bentley. The meet begins at 7 p.m.

Kirstan Kinsman and Michele Lister each won two events to highlight North Farmington's 94-66 win over Redford Thurston in the Northwest Suburban League. North is 3-2-1 overall and 2-0 in the conference.

Kinsman, a junior, won the 200 individual medley (2:25.9) and the 100 back (1:09.6). Lister took the 200 free (2:08.7) and the 100 free (58.7). North's 200 medley relay (Kinsman, Mary Manderfield, Monique Look and Karen Spain) won in 2:09.4.

Thurston's Dawn Miller won the 500 freestyle in 5:56.7, and teammate Sue Morse won the 100 backstroke in 1:15.3.

North swims next on Tuesday at home against Brighton. The meet has a 7 p.m. start.

Nancy Whittemore won two individual events and swam on a winning relay as Farmington Harrison outswam Livonia Churchill, 116-55, in the Western Six League. Harrison is 2-8 overall.

Whittemore won the 50 free (27.4) and the 100 butterfly (1:08.1) and teamed with Niki Allen, Sue Waak and Helen Tucker to win the 400 relay in 4:18.0. Allen won the 200 free (2:21.2) and the 100 free (1:03.8). Harrison's Sue Pickett won the diving event with 172.24 points.

Enrollment in the Farmington Public Schools for the school year ending June 30, 1980, dropped to 12,553 students from 13,270 students the previous year, a drop of 7.1, approximately 5.4%.

Expenditures increased to \$30,554,640 from \$28,373,478 the previous year, an increase of \$2,181,162, approximately 7.7%.

Revenues increased to \$31,451,310 from \$28,394,139 the previous year, an increase of \$3,057,171, approximately 10.8%.

With revenues exceeding expenditures the excess added to the fund equity of the prior year established a fund equity as of June 30, 1980, of \$1,351,689. Of this equity \$803,668 has been appropriated for unamortized bus costs, new buses on order as of June 30, and other open purchase orders of that date, leaving an unappropriated equity of \$547,791.

The decline in enrollment which has been occurring for the past several years, and which is expected to continue for the next several years, has continued to be a major concern of the school district. Considerable effort has been made to keep the expenditures per pupil in line with CIP's and revenues available to the district.

87% of the expenditures were made for direct instructional costs (teachers, aides, teaching supplies, textbooks, etc.). 7% of the expenditures were made for student support services (counselors, librarians, speech correctionists, social workers, etc.).

Support services for the instructional staff and administration at the school level accounted for 13% of the expenditures. Operations (school cleaning, heating and lighting, etc.) maintenance and pupil transportation was 18%, and all other expenses totaled 4%.

Revenues from local sources of the district increased from 78.9% in 1979 to 83.5% in 1980, while revenues from the state decreased from 13.5% in 1979 to 8.2% in 1980. This trend has continued for several years.

Objectives of the district were to provide the best education possible for its students, within the financial limitation placed on the district. It is felt these objectives were met.
