## Area runners qualify for state tournament

Lukasiewicz, who played at No. 1 singles for Harrison, started out by beating Theresa Barber of St. Clair Shores South Lake, 6-0, 6-3. In the second round, Michelle Miller of Forest Hills Central beat Lukasiewicz, 6-3, 6-2.

"Joelle played well, but Miller was a lot bigger and stronger," said Harrison coach Bernie Goldstein.

Lukasiewicz finished with a 15-4 match record.

### GIRLS' SWIMMING

Kim Pogue and Amy Edwards each won two individual events, but Farmington High fell to Livonia Bentley, 90-82, in a girls' swimming meet Tuesday. The loss was Farmington's first in nine outings this season.

Pogue won the 200-yard freestyle (2:03.7) and the 500 free (5:34.1), and Edwards won the 50 free (26.5) and the 100 free (58.5). Farmington's Jenny Ratliff won the diving event with 199 points, and teammate Cindi Meili won the 100 breaststroke in 1:14.6.

Bentley's Jenny Feder won the 200 individual medley (2:18.0) and the 100 backstroke (1:04.4). Teammate Julia Westhaus won the 100 butterfly in 1:03.2.

Farmington swims next on Nov. 6 at Livonia Stevenson. The meet has a 7 p.m. start.

Farmington Our Lady of Mercy ran its dual-meet record to 7-0 with a 70-13 win over Grosse Pointe Star of the Sea in the Catholic League.

Ann Landino, a Mercy junior, established a pool record in the diving event with 218.50 points. Mercy's Beth Drolet qualified for the state meet in the 50 free with a time of 25.6.

In the Western Six League, Northville High downed Farmington Harrison, 52-32. Harrison is 5-7 overall.

Harrison won only two of the 11 events. Linda Waak won the 100 breast in 1:26.0 and then anchored the 400 free relay (with Niki Allen, Hele Tucker and Nancy Whittemore), which won with a time of 4:17.9.

Northville's Allison Farquhar won the 200 IM (2:20.3) and the 100 butterfly (1:03.9).

Harrison swims next at 7 p.m. tonight at Plymouth Canton.

North Farmington's Mary Manderfield won two events in a losing cause last Tuesday. She finished first in the 200 free (2:09.7) and the 100 free (58.6) as the Raiders dropped a 90-80 decision to non-league Brighton High.

North, now 3-3 overall, swims next at home at 7 p.m. on Thursday. Redford Union will provide the opposition.

### BOYS' SOCCER

Farmington Lutheran High Northwest's soccer team fell to 0-9-1 after its 4-1 loss to Roseville Baptist Academy last week. Bob McCredy scored an unassisted goal for Northwest.

Northwest plays next on Friday in the opening round of the Michigan Independent Athletic Conference post-season tournament.

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### CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A Regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was held October 20, 1980 in the Council Chambers, 23500 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mayor William S. Hartsock.

PRESENT: Mayor Hartsock, Councilmen Bennett, Buckler, Tupper and Yoder. ABSENT: None.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Director Billing, Director Seifert, Attorney Kelly, City Clerk Viane.

The minutes of previous meetings were approved. The minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

Council instructed that a letter be forwarded to Mr. Ernest Sauter commending him for his services on the Library Board and his appointment to the Wayne Oakland Library Federation Board.

A letter from the Planning Commission regarding items forwarded to the Commission prior to Council decision was received.

City Manager Deadman advised Council of a special non-public preview for government representatives of the Michigan Energy Expo '80 to be held at Cobo Hall November 12, 1980.

Council supported the City of Birmingham's position which opposes proposed rules of the Michigan Department of Public Health which would preempt local communities' rights to regulate the Housing Codes.

A proposed ordinance requesting site plan approval for the construction of parking lots was referred back to the Planning Commission.

City Manager Deadman reported on the progress of the Orchard Lake widening from Ten Mile Road to Grand River and Council approved a letter written by the Administration advising the Oakland County Board of Road Commissioners of the city's position regarding the necessity for a high priority being given this portion of the widening project.

Council authorized the City Manager to enter into an agreement with Merritt, Cole & McCullum to review the mechanical systems within the city's Municipal Building.

Council accepted a rate increase from Dr. Viegut, Veterinarian, for dog impoundment services.

Ordinance C-470-80 which would raise the fees for dog impoundment services was introduced.

City Manager Deadman was authorized to notify outside water users at 31715, 31635 and 31815 Nine Mile Road that the city will discontinue water service to them effective April 1, 1981.

Council authorized payment to William E. Anderson, Inc., Scottfield, Michigan, in the amount of \$1,000 for final payment on the Municipal Building remodeling.

Council authorized payment in the amount of \$8,499.30 to Gerry D'Pol & Sons, Inc. for work completed through October 15, 1980 on the Water Improvement Project.

Council went on record as opposing Proposal D appearing on the November 4, 1980 General Election ballot.

Public comments were received.

Financial Report General Fund, 3 months ended 9/30/80.

Financial Report 4th District Court, 3 months ended 9/30/80.

The monthly bills were approved for payment.

A special meeting was established for Saturday, November 8, 1980 at 9:00 a.m. to discuss the Warner Mansion.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m.
