

Exec candidates lead pack in Campaign '80 spending

Candidates for five Oakland County offices have spent next to nothing to date, but \$100,000 trying to get elected Nov. 4.

The countywide office candidates filed mandatory pre-election campaign finance reports with the county clerk's election division last week.

Candidates for county executive led in spending. Democrat F. Thomas Lewand, of Royal Oak, reported spending \$110,000 in the campaign he began in March.

Republican incumbent Daniel T. Murphy's re-election committee didn't list a cumulative spending total in the latest report, but additions from previous reports show Murphy has spent more than \$100,000 in the campaign.

Democrats Albert A. Keenan, of Southfield, and Daniel W. Barry, of

Pontiac, candidates for clerk and drain commissioner, have reportedly not spent more than \$500 each in their campaigns.

THIRD IN spending among countywide office seekers was Republican Prosecutor I. Brooks Patterson, \$88,768, followed by Democratic Sheriff Johannes Sproen, \$20,015; his Republican opponent James V. Stewart, \$10,104.

Drain Commissioner George Kuhn (R) spent \$8,000; County Clerk Lynn Allen (R), \$7,777; prosecutor candidate Martin Krohn (D), \$4,197.

Sproen reported the largest bank balance among the candidates as of last Friday, the due date of the reports.

The "Friends of Sheriff Sproen" committee listed a balance of \$13,922. The report listed a \$10,000 contribution from the "Non-partisan Committee for

the Re-election of Sheriff Sproen."

Both committees are registered, a spokesperson for the county clerk's office said, but the "non-partisan" committee had not met the Friday reporting deadline. Candidates who miss the deadline are fined \$10 per day.

County Executive Murphy's re-election committee reported a bank balance of \$11,883, followed by Kuhn, \$4,020; Krohn, \$2,004; Allen, \$2,544; Stewart, \$1,065; Patterson, \$931, and Lewand, \$479.

THE UNITED Auto Workers union has assisted the treasurer of Democrats Lewand, Krohn and Sproen.

Lewand reports \$40,400 in contributions from the UAW; Krohn, \$3,000, and Sproen, \$2,000.

The Oakland County Democratic Party has spent more than \$22,000 in cash and services on the Lewand cam-

aign and more than \$1,000 each for Sproen and Krohn for printing.

Murphy's department heads remained consistent ticket buyers for the county executive's golf outing and cocktail party fund-raiser.

Since late August, another \$1,180 was given by eight county department directors. Since August 1979, nine directors had given more than \$3,700 to Murphy's committee.

Other large contributors listed on the Murphy campaign's latest report include the Committee for Republicans, \$200; Edward C. Levy, of Bay Harbor Islands, Fla., \$1,000, and W.M. Packer Jr., \$580.

The J.L. Hudson Political Action Committee (HUDPAC) gave another

\$350 to Murphy's committee during the latest reporting period, bringing its total to \$500.

PROSECUTOR PATTERSON listed two loans totaling \$5,000 from himself and a \$3,200 loan from his chief assistant, Richard Thompson, on his latest report. Patterson's committee also reports a three-year old debt of \$10,000 from 1977 to Albert Thompson, of Dearborn.

The Patterson committee's debt is \$18,246, according to the latest report. The second-largest debt belongs to Lewand, \$10,200. Murphy's committee is \$4,500 in debt; Sproen's is \$1,811, and Stewart's, \$1,200.

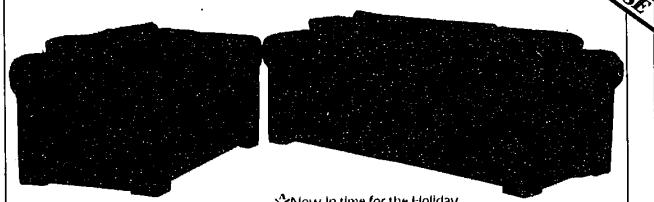

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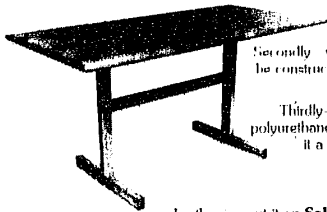
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
