Altman estimates the presidential race may bring out between 75 and 80 percent of the county electorate. He said a national turnout of more than 70 percent of registered voters has been estimated.

"We have been above the national for some time." Altman said.

While neighboring Wayne County has shown a four-year registration decline, Oakland's vo-ter lists have swelled by 80,658 since 1976 and more than 141,000 since 1972.

THE PROSECUTOR, treasurer, clerkand drain commissioner races have drawn far less attention. Republican incumbents Patterson, C. Hugh Dohany, Lynn Allen and George Kuhn are expected to win re-election easily.

Patterson's opponent is Martin Krohner, a Farmington Hills Democrat and an assistant Wayne County pro-secutor. Democratic candidate for treasurer is Robert Rosman of Bir-mingham, clerk, Albert A. Keenan of Birmingham, and drain commissioner, Daniel Berry of Union Lake.

Keenan, an insurance agent, ran un-successfully for the 15th district county commission seat two years age. While having no particular disagreements with the way Allen has run the clerk and register of deeds offices, Keenan says a change is needed in the office.

Keenan has spent less than \$1,000 in the campaign.

Rosman and Berry have also kept low profiles in their bids to unseat Re-publican incumbents Dohany, of South-field and Kuhn, of West Bloomfield. Barry was drain commissioner from 1956 to 1971.

Largely through name recognition, Barry defeated the county Democratic Party's choice for drain commissioner in the August primary. He was drain commissioner for 16 years but was forced to resign in a conflict of interest charge in 1971.

IN THE RACE for a six-year term on the OakLand Circuit Court, Water-ford District Judge Robert C. Anderson is expected to prevail over assistant county prosecutor James F. McCarthy, of Waterford.

Anderson has the backing of both county political parties and a pre-primary 52 percent "superior" rating from the Oakland County Bar Association.
