

Goodfellows rev up for holidays

Bettie McPhall and Florence E. Schumaker are busily making clothes and connecting new hairdos for dolls they've collected to give to the Goodfellows Christmas drive.

The collection of dolls, games and other toys which fills odd corners of their Farmington Hills homes are part of the Goodfellow pledge that there be no child without a Christmas.

The Goodfellows need help again this year to make good on their pledge to help about 200 needy families in the Farmington and Farmington Hills area.

New toys, gloves, scarves and hats are needed for children of families on the Goodfellows' list, according to the group's spokesman Jim Stevens.

In addition to these items, each boy will receive a shirt and each girl will be given a new dress.

Although their motto refers to a child's Christmas, the Goodfellows bring holiday cheer to needy adults as well. Senior citizens and childless adults are on their list this year, too, according to Stevens.

All of the families on the Goodfellows list receive canned goods, cereals

and checks which they can use at their own discretion.

Families are chosen through recommendations by teachers, neighbors and friends.

TO RECOMMEND a family to the Goodfellows or to donate toys or clothing to the drive, call the Farmington Chamber of Commerce at 474-3440. Volunteers also can call the Chamber of Commerce.

Checks should be made payable to the Farmington Goodfellows and sent to the organization at Box 15, Farmington 48024.

Old newspaper carriers will be in force Dec. 5 when the Goodfellows conduct their annual paper drive. Funds raised by selling the Goodfellows editions are used in the Christmas drive.

There is no deadline for contributing to the fund.

"We go on all year. We use the money for emergencies such as if a child needs shoes during the year for school. Then we'll go out and quickly buy them," said Stevens.

"But we're most active during Christmas."

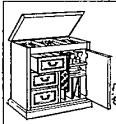
