ALONG WITH this evolution came the parallel development in the train-ing of group leaders, known as peer counselors. This was training offered to those who had completed the original

programs of personal growth and carreer development.

As the acceptance of the use of paraprofessional counselors grew, the center expanded its efforts again; this time to train the counselors for specific groups. groups.
