

Harrison's defense does the job, 7-6

Farmington Harrison coach John Herrington should make a TV commercial.

Hey coach, the voice would ask, how do you spell relief?

And Herrington would answer: Well, when we're playing Jackson Lumen Christi in the state Class B high school football playoffs, I spell it, D-E-F-E-N-S-E.

Much to Herrington's relief, the Hawk defense, coached by Bob Sutter, did the job last Saturday, blocking a point-after kick and stopping Lumen Christi three times after it had penetrated the Hawk 10-yard line.

And the offense provided just enough in the Hawks' 7-6 victory over previously unbeaten and defending Class B champ Lumen Christi in the quarterfinal game at Riverview High School.

The Hawks will take their 10-0 record to Brighton High School next Saturday to play Okemos in the semifinal round.

"Coach Sutter really earned his pay today," Herrington said after the game. "I didn't have to do a thing. Give his kids the credit. I just can't say enough about them."

Harrison's defense — led by linebackers Bruce Yeager and Dan Kehagias, monster man Bill Miller and safety Reggie Upshaw — stopped Lumen Christi late in the game on the Harrison two.

It was fourth down and Lumen Christi had to move one yard for the first down and two for the go-ahead touchdown. With time running out, that TD could have meant victory for the Jackson squad.

But Miller, a 5-foot-11, 175-pound junior, came up with the big play, nailing Lumen Christi's Tim Schonhard for a loss. Harrison took over on downs and ran out the clock.

ANOTHER BIG defensive play came right after Lumen Christi scored on a six-yard pass play from quarterback

Jason Schomer to end Mark Conway in the second quarter. Keggias, a 160-pound senior, broke through to block the point-after kick.

On another occasion, Lumen Christi marched to the Hawk six. Schonhard fumbled the handoff, and tackle Bob Kassab pounced on the ball. On still another march, Yeager spoiled things by tackling Schonhard behind the line of scrimmage.

"You've got to give it to their kids," said Lumen Christi coach Herb Brogan. "We had several nice scoring chances and they stopped us every time."

Harrison, which was outstrung and outplayed by Jackson, missed a few scoring chances, too. Twice the Hawks moved deep into enemy territory only to lose the ball on interceptions.

"You don't usually win when you squander scoring opportunities like that," Herrington said. "I didn't think we executed that well. We had the kids open, but we just couldn't hit the passes."

Harrison QB Jim Macielack connected on just two of nine pass attempts, but one of them went 79 yards to Upshaw, known for his speed as a split end, for the opening touchdown. Dave Blackmer kicked the extra point.

Harrison's Reggie Upshaw, who has rushed for more than 1,200 yards this season, gained 100 against Lumen Christi. Schonhard picked up 92 yards, and teammate Kevin Blair had 45.

Harrison's victory snapped Lumen Christi's 23-game winning streak, which started in 1978. The Jackson school had won Class B championships in 1979 and 1977.

Falcon cagers stumble

Pontiac Northern's guards, Sharon Brown and Pat King, combined to score 49 points Thursday as the Huskies turned back Farmington High, 65-55, in an Inter-Lakes League girls' basketball game in Pontiac.

Farmington, which had beaten Northern by three points in an earlier meeting, fell to 7-9 overall and 3-5 in the conference.

The game was close until the fourth quarter when Northern outscored the Falcons, 20-14. The score was tied at 30 at halftime, and Northern pulled ahead by four points after three quarters.

"That fourth quarter was all run and shoot," said Farmington coach Bob Lekovich. "We'd miss a layup and Northern'd get the rebound and hustle back and get an easy basket."

"We played real well. We just couldn't run with them."

The 5-foot-6 Brown scored 29 points on 13 baskets and three of six free throws. King tallied 20, and center June Hardy contributed nine and pulled down 11 rebounds.

Sue Carruthers scored 19 points for Farmington, and Linda Borchanian added

16. Falcon center Stacy Green picked off 19 rebounds to go with her eight points.

Farmington plays next on Tuesday, Nov. 11, at Farmington Harrison. The varsity contest begins at 7:30 p.m.

In another game Thursday, Pam Drury and Cuthi Henry led Redford Union to a second-half comeback and a 63-36 win over North Farmington in the Northwest Suburban League. North dropped to 2-14 overall and 1-7 in the NSL.

Henry scored 19 of her game-high 24 points, and Drury tossed in 12 of her 22 after intermission. Lori Pastulla, RU's 6-foot-2 center, scored seven points and dominated the boards.

"Pastulla really cleaned up," said a frustrated North coach Greg Grodzicki. "We had only nine offensive rebounds."

North plays next on Thursday, Nov. 13, at home against Livonia Franklin. The Northwest Suburban League game has a 7:30 p.m. start.

Waterford Mott, with Bridget Brennan scoring 14 points and Donna Grohs added 10, downed Farmington Harrison, 43-34, in

a Western Six League game on the Hawks' court.

Lori Winkel scored 15 points for Harrison, now 2-13 overall and 1-8 in the WSL.

Laura Gebel scored 10 points for Farmington Lutheran Northwest in its 68-32 loss to Detroit Lutheran West Thursday in a non-league game. Northwest, now 2-11, hosts Bloomfield Hills Rooper at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday.

NF tankers win; Farmington falls

North Farmington won nine of the 11 events Thursday in beating Garden City East, 89-75, in a Northwest Suburban League girls' swimming meet in East's pool.

The victory left North Farmington with a 5-4-1 overall record and a 4-0 mark in the Northwest Suburban.

North won both relays. The 200 medley crew (Kristan Kinsman, Mary Manderfield, Kay Harnden and Michele Lister) posted a 2:02.1. The 400 freestyle team (Judy Kettner, Stacey Greenberg, Deanna Miller and Helen Sue Howard) logged a time of 4:35.5.

Lister won the 200 individual medley (2:27.3), Howard won the 50 freestyle (1:27.3), Manderfield won the 100 free (1:01.1). Miller won the 500 freestyle (1:01.1) and Harnden won the 100 breaststroke (1:20.1).

Other North winners: Mary Shuey (2:16.2 in the 200 freestyle), and Monique Lock (1:12.1, 100 butterfly). East's Diana Smoler won the diving event with 108.70 points, and teammate Sandra Pawlak won the 100 backstroke in 1:11.6.

North Farmington hosts non-league Northville High on Tuesday and closes out the regular season at Livonia Franklin, an

NSL foe, on Thursday.

FARMINGTON HIGH won four events Thursday in a losing effort against Livonia Stevenson, 100-72. Stevenson is 11-2; Farmington has an 8-2 record.

Farmington diver Jenny Ratliff earned 182.60 points for her first place. Another came in the 500 freestyle where Kim Pogue was timed in 5:32.8.

Dawn Stanton won the 100 backstroke for Farmington with a time of 1:07.3, and teammate Cindi Meil finished first in the 100 breaststroke in 1:14.0.

"It (the outcome of the meet) was expected," said Farmington coach Mark Liddridge. "She (Stevenson coach Lois McDonald) has a team that is tough to contend with. She has a lot of depth, and it's talented depth."

"I'd say that half her team is qualified for the state meet in one event or another."

Stevenson had a double winner in Karen Wynn. She topped the 50 free (28.5) and the 100 free (58.2).

Farmington swims next on Thursday at home against West Bloomfield. The meet begins at 7 p.m.
