

Sexuality Guidance group picks topic

Fourteen area counselors will be among speakers on human sexuality when the Michigan Personnel and Guidance Association holds a state convention Nov. 16-18 in the Renaissance Center, Detroit. Some 2,000 professionals in guidance are expected to attend.

"The last two decades have witnessed a dramatic change in the quality and quantity of sexual awareness and human interaction in our culture," said Chairman John R. Webber, director of counseling services at Schoolcraft College, Livonia.

Webber said the conference would examine "personal attitudes about sexuality, morality and social issues that affect our actions and reactions as counselors and human service personnel."

Area persons who will speak include: Lilith Ren, Rochester, "Values and Sexuality"; Elinor Waters, director of Oakland University's Continuum Center, "It's a Boy/Girl: Importance of Sex Roles"; Sandra Landsman, clinical director of

Landsman/Foner & Associates, West Bloomfield, Dr. Janice Guerrero, "A Review of Traditional and Modern Treatment of Sexual Issues"; Judy Jacobs, Troy, "Domestic Violence."

Keynote speaker will be Mary S. Calverton, president of Sex Information and Education Council of the U.S.

Sessions will be held during daytime hours Nov. 17 and 18 and are open to the public.

Women's roles examined at seminar

Women's Studies Week at Eastern Michigan University, focusing on "Women and Social Change: Women as Activists," will feature a variety of activities planned throughout the week of Nov. 10 through 15.

A lecture about a German radical feminist today kicks off the week's activities. The lecture, titled "Introduction to Lilly Braun," explores the writings of this advocate of women's education and author of many essays exploring the conflict of the need for fulfillment through work and motherhood.

Dr. Al Meyers, a professor of political science at The University of Michigan, will give the lecture at noon in the Guild Hall of McKenny Union. Meyers lectures and writes articles about Soviet politics, Marxist theory, Soviet foreign policy and communist ideology.

Tuesday, Dr. Marjorie Lansing, a professor of political science at EMU, will review her newly published book, "Women and Politics: The Invisible Majority" at noon in the Reception Lounge of McKenny Union. Lansing, with co-author Sandra Baxter, ex-

amined the voting behavior of women during the past 25 years. Among her findings, Lansing discovered that women now outvote men and vote consistently in opposing war.

The first woman elected district attorney in the U.S., Margaret Jordan, will present a lecture Wednesday, Nov. 12, at 8 p.m. in Roosevelt Auditorium.

Her lecture is titled, "Women, Politics and the Law."

Activities Thursday, Nov. 13, begin with a University of Michigan graduate student performing women's protest songs at noon in the Faculty Lounge of McKenny Union. Paula Amman will sing folk songs and her own songs in this performance. She has sung at the Homegrown Women's Music Series, the May Political Arts Festival and the Ark Coffeehouse.

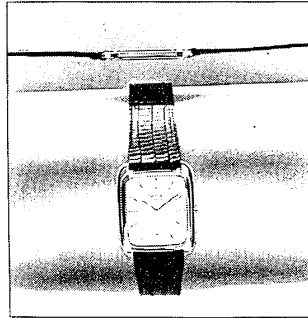
Dr. Derek Davenport, head of the general chemistry department at Purdue University, will present two lectures Thursday. First, Davenport will hold an informal discussion about "Ca-

reers of Women in Science" at 2 p.m. In Science reading Room 227 in Mark Jefferson Hall. At 4 p.m., he will present "Early Vindication of the Rights of Women Chemists" in Strong Auditorium. The lecture will review the contribution of three chemists active in the late 1700s and early 1800s.

Also at 2 p.m. Thursday, Kathy Kendall will present "Translating Oral History into Dramatic Productions" in the Jones Rehearsal Hall. Kendall will discuss the oral histories of unusual women and her dramatizations based on these histories. Kendall is a New Orleans writer, actress and drug counselor. Also she is a member of the steering committee of the Feminist Writers' Guild.

Andra Canaan is a black lesbian feminist poet from New Orleans who will read her poetry, which is characterized by southern sensuality and erotic power.

Also, she will discuss "brownness," which she explored in an essay by published soon in "Third World Women," an anthology of women's writings. Canaan was recently fired from her job with the state of Louisiana for stating she is a lesbian. She has filed a lawsuit in the case.



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
