It's hard to tell mushy from firm.

While some of the choices come easy, others require extra thought. "This is a big item, with a lot of money involved," said Miss Jehnsen, reviewing popular fruit cocktail.

Throughout the discussion — which got heated at times — Miss Jehnsen framaded reasons for rejecting items.
