While Michigan's trail system remains basically unchanged for the third straight season, it already is so vast that owners of the state's nearly 260,000 registered snow-mobiles need not worry about running out of new trails to explore. "Michigan's state forests are criss-crossed by nearly 2,300 miles of marked trails, and its four national forest systems add another 1,300 miles of trails and outes," says Auto Club of Michigan Tour-ing Manager Joseph Ratke. The three-year snowmobile registration fee will rise from \$9 to \$15 in 1981, and all of that \$6 increase is earmarked for new trail construction.

"However, because of Michigan's pres ent economic situation, the added money will replace funds for new trail" already cut from the budget, meaning no new money actually will be available for ma-jor construction," says Ratke.
