A 22,000-square-feet building on Newburgh

shop.

Cook said his division has nearly 10 Midwestern routes in St. Louis, Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Chicago, all served by the North Lake plant.

Trucks leave the Illinois bakery between 8 and 9 p.m. daily and make deliveries to depots in those cities for immediate early morning transfer by Entenman routemen to points of sale.


