Silverdome subsidy: lesson in political maneuvers

Old-fashioned political back-scratching caused two western Wayne County state representatives to switch their votes and support the controversial \$800,000 state subsidy to the Pontiac Silverdome last week.

'Under pressure from Oakland County legislators and Silverdome lobbyists,
Livonia Republicans Jack Kirksey and
Sylvia Skrel voted to continue the
state's annual contribution to the 5year-old stadium's debt retirement.
In return, they got assurances of con-

tinued state grants of \$800,000 to the city of Livonia and \$775,000 to the city of Northville for policing traffic generated by the Detroit Race Course and Northville Downs, respectively. Even though House opponents of the Silverdome subsidy prevailed (56-51), the grant is expected to be reinstated by the Senate this week. The entire bill will then go to a joint legislative conference committee.

BOTH LEGISLATORS initially voted with the House of Representa-tives majority (62-30) Wednesday to re-

"I RESENTED having to vote that way, but I felt obligated to do so," said Kirksey. "It would have been a disaster to Livonia and Northville if those funds

to Livonia and Northville if those funds had been in jeopardy."

Kirksey's district is the only one in Michigan with two race tracks.

Tom Griffith, a city accountant, said the state money goes in Livonia's general fund. "A piece of it goes to every activity within that general fund," he said.

Livonia Police Chief Robert Turner said the city has "22 to 30" officers ass-

inged to DRC daily when it's open, in-cluding 'four to seven' plain-clothes of-ficers inside.

"They would have a lot of thefts if we-weren't there." Turner said. He esti-mated that cost of police service alone approaches \$300,000 annually, includ-ing time spent by officers processing arrests and appearing in court.

"When it's empty, we still keep pa-trolligh it," he added. Turner said the track is usually open eight months a year.

Other western Wayne legislators supported removal of the Silverdome subsidy. They include state Reps. John Bennett, D-Redford, Thomas Brown, D-Westland, William Keith, D-Garden City, and Roy Smith, R-Saline.

Artists Series begins with Romantic touch



The season of six concerts runs through May 3, with concerts scheduled for Feb. 1, March 8 and 29 and April 12.




