How would you move the 4-1?

Many would bear off a man and hit on the I point. Good, but not so good. If a shot. But now your distribution is permitte stayed on the bar, unable to re-enter on the 4, 5 or 6 point, you may not bable to cover the I-point blot. You could also roil double 3s, 4s, 5s and 5s and leave a double shot, or double 2s for a single shot.

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• WHAT IS A BACKGAMMON?

Janet C. of Livonia asks, "What is a backgammon in the game of backgam-mon, and how do you play for it?

Winning a backgammon is the "elite" when playing a game of back-gammon. It happens, but not very of-ten, mostly by luck. The only time you win a backgammon is when you are finished bearing off and your opponent has one or more checkers in your home board or on the bar.

Winning a backgammon triples the point value of that game. Since winning each game is worth one point for the victor, a backgammon would triple the score for three points. If the doubling cube had been turned to 2, a backgammon would triple the cube for a sixpolit win.

A "gammon" doubles the point value of the game being played. You "gammon" your opponent when you are finished bearing off and he has not yet borne off any checkers — even if he has them all home.

I wish there was a way you could "play on" for a backgammon (triple score), but I haven't yet found it. By rolling extremely perfect dice while your opponent has perfectly terrible rolls, it can be done.

In the example, black rolls a 4-1. Al-though he has to leave a shot, depend-ing on how he plays it, he may back-gammon white.



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
