Earth sheltered housing sparks images of a damp, cave-like dwelling, complete with flickering candle and

complete with flickering candle and spiders.

Fledgling entrepreneurs Paul Seul and Fred Van Vurst — engineers by profession — are trying to change that Image. Seul, of Canton, and Van Vurst, of Northville, have been partners since July 1379 in Challenge Engineering and Construction Co.

They spend most of their time as subcontractors on construction jobs. But the pair also have a keen interest in building earth sheltered homes.

The houses Seul and Van Vurst propose to build would be nestled into the natural terrain, surrounded on three sides by earth.

natural terrain, sarrounded sides by earth.
There is a "lot of misconception about dampness" associated with the concept, Seul said.
"There is nothing dripping from the

ceiling," said Seul, 27. "There are no spiders, and you don't need boots. "The earth modifies the outside temperature — keeps it more constant. If you go down further into the earth, it reaches a constant temperature."

THE HOUSE would be built of waterproofed concrete. It would contain insulation of rigid materials that could hold up against acid or dampness in the soil.

By building the house with a southern exposure, the house could take advantage of passive solar energy, Van Vurst said. Heat from the sun would be absorbed through large glass panes

be absorbed through large glass panes in the house.

The roof would be covered with two feet of dirt. And heat could be provided by a wood-burning stove and passive solar energy, with forced-air natural gas heat as a backup.

"YOU LOOK five years down the

road at energy (costs)," said Van Vurst, 30.

The concept is based roughly on sod houses, which were built in prairie states during the 19th century, said Kathleen Vadanis, editor of Earth Shelter Digest and Energy Report. The magazine is published by Webeo Publishing Co. of St. Paul, Minn. Ms. Vadanis said earth sheltered housing began to catch on after the oil embargo of the 1970s. The partners' interest in earth sheltered housing has evolved as an adjunct to their main role as subcontractors on remodeling and construction projects.

The pair had been working for the same construction company when

they decided to strike out on their own in 1979.

"Since this is new, (people) aren't geared up for it," said Van Vurst, a native of Bloomfield Hills and a former Canton residen.

The model is imperative," said Seul. The partners have bought 33 acres between Plymouth and Ann Arbor and hope to build at least one model.

"It's like trying to sell a car without seeing it," said Van Vurst. "You have to educate a whole lot of people."

SO FAR, Seul and Van Vurst have sold their idea to two clients. Con-struction of both houses is slated for 1981.


