## Helping those who let their fingers do the reading

Picture a domino. Notice the dots along its rectangular surface. Then imight be dots a raised so they can be felt by the fingers of the blind. It may help you sinderstand the idea behind braille, the method used by the blind to read. In 1824 and inventive, blind French tees-sight mamed Louis Braille came up with the idea of a cell of six dots, arranged in many different ways to equal in letters of the alphabet.

His idea had such permanent value that today a group of women meets each week in Carl Sandburg Library in Livonia to help the blind take advantage of the system of raised dots developed by young Braille. TRANSCHIBING IS not easy.

"It takes a lot of concentration and perseverance," said Mrs. Wozniak, who studies Braille every Wednesday from 9:30-11 am. in the Sandburg class. She also practices about an hour a day at home. The aim of the students is to become good enough at transcribing to pass a test given by the Library of Congress.

To become a certified Braillist they must finish the study manual. Then they have to mail to the Washington library a 35-page manuscript they have done in Braille. It must have no mis-

Needless to say, to acquire speed in reading or transcribing, both the blind readers and transcibers must memorize all the letters and contractions.

"EACH WEEK THERE is more to memorize," said Mrs. Gell of Farming-ton-But I'm going to stick it out. Eight months ago I broke my hip, and there is not much I am able to do. But this is something I can do that is interesting and challenging, and will someday prove to be beneficial."

Errors would spoil the end product for the reader. We have to learn to be perfect." She noted that the stress on perfection doesn't make ahe nervous, "but it makes me put in a lot more effort." Mrs. Wozniak is aware there are kids in high school who don't care about reading." She added. "Blind people don't have the opportunity they have. We are here give it to them. Transcribers do about two books a year, she estimated. Temple Beth-El provides the machines, which cost \$200 apiece.

MRS. SEATON is also impressed that the blind can read by fouch. "It seems so complicated for a seeing person," she said. "To her the training is a challenge. "It's difficult," she said. "But I think you have to put something into any."
