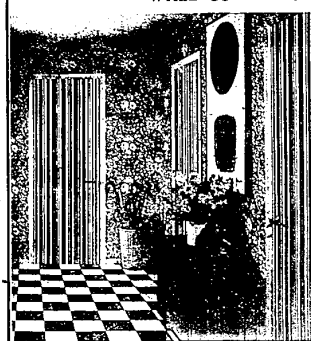
### Conversation Starters

### Computers Coming To Checkout Line

A major breakthrough in the supermarket checkout line may be coming in a year or two, says a Kroger official.

It involves coded price-marking that can be read by the computer and added automatically as products pass by.

N. A. Sawall, vice president of the Detroit retail division of Kroger Food Stores, says a working model of such a checkstand has been developed.

But Sawall doesn't foresee the completely electronic supermarket in the near future, where pushbuttons would replace carts. Women still want to see the steaks and tomatoes they're buying.

Freeze-dry foods, which need only water to restore their natural taste and texture could also revolutionize food selling, Sawall said.

Another innovation, irradiation, could allow the housewife to store a steak or fresh strawberries on the pantry shelf for months.

To show the complexity of running a modern supermarket system, Sawall said Kroger stores today carry 8,000 different items, compared to only 700 in the 1930's.
