Elmer is a blind, retired WWI veteran now living in Redford Township. A few years back he purchased the lots for \$3,700 and just last week (like many other taxnavers) is at a letter talling him what

many other taxpayers) got a letter telling him what his new assessment is.

The two and one-half-acre lots are now as ne two and one-halt-acre lots are now assessed at \$13,400. Since property under the state constitution is assessed at 50% of its market value, this means Elmer's lots should sell for \$26,800.

\$26,800.

And so Elmer has a "government appraisal" that his property is worth \$26,800 but says is is willing to sell, to the first taker, both lots for only \$13,000. They are vacant, zoned residential, and aren't served by sanitary sewer. But what's a sewer when the land is going for half-price?
